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#### Dear Readers

Welcome to another New Year, I trust that everyone had a joyous and safe festive period. From a personal perspective I left Gascoyne Junction in early December to have an operation to remove any Melanoma at the primary site on my face and to remove all the lymph nodes in my neck. The operation went well but it was a bit bigger than I thought, I spent four hours on the table and a night in intensive **care.** After a couple of week's recovery I commenced 6 weeks of radio therapy. Initially this was pretty easy but weeks 3 through to 6 were challenging to say the least. I am now slowly recovering from this treatment and have now commenced a further 12 months of Immunotherapy; which will require me to fly to Perth once a fortnight. I have arranged to fly down on a Friday and return on the Saturday so the disruption to the Shire will be minimal.

I would like to express my sincere thanks to all my Staff, Councillors and community for their support, at times like this support is very important. Whilst I was away Jarrod Walker was appointed as the Acting CEO and he has done a great job; Peter Stocker filled for Jarrod and all other staff stepped up to the plate to assist. It is very pleasing to see that we can cover for each other internally making our Shire that much more robust.

I am now back at work and have hit the ground running, I am still working through some of the legacy issues but these are relatively minor.

Progress is happening with Ullawarra Road with contractors now onsite and they have commenced remedial works. The Shire staff have also mobilised to Ullawarra Road and we will also commence with remediation works. It is anticipated that we will receive further contribution from Hastings in the near future so that we can continue with the remedial works.

The contractors for our WANDRRA works are now all back on site and have commenced works, the three contractors have completed approximately 50% of the works.

It was pleasing to see that the Bitumen works and the work on Pimbee Road have been completed, these are never ending jobs but if we keep chipping away we are able to maintain our assets in a reasonable condition.

Dave Higgs and Nat have been busy around town, the Shade Structure that compliments the Arts and **Craft's accommodation, work room and gymnasium has been finished. Dave is currently getting the** footing for the new War Memorial laid so we can erect the new War Memorial.

Various lawns and parks have had a hard time due to issues with getting water from our river bore and a host of reticulation failures. Dave and Nat have worked through these issues and it now appears that we able to get enough water on the ground and the lawns and plants are now recovering.

Now that I am back I look forward to 2019 with a great deal of optimism and that as a Shire we continue to deliver the best possible outcomes for our community. It promises to be another interesting and busy year but I would not have it any other way.

## Remember – No Jab means No Pay

#### 31 January 2019

As the new school year begins, Federal Member for Durack and Minister for the Environment Melissa **Price reminds families in the Durack electorate to make sure their children's vaccinations are up to date –** whether they are school age or younger.

Parents should ensure their children are fully vaccinated so they are protected against infectious diseases. Not fully vaccinating means that families will lose part of their fortnightly Family Tax Benefit payment.

Family Tax Benefit Part A payments are reduced by approximately \$28 a fortnight for each child who does not meet the immunisation requirements, under the current *No Jab, No Pay* policy.

Since the policy started on 1 July 2018, on average, more than 500 children a day who did not meet immunisation requirements, have taken action to meet these requirements.

Minister Price said the change to *No Jab, No Pay* provides a constant reminder for parents to keep their **children's immunisation up to date.** 

"Immunisation is the safest way to protect children from vaccine-preventable diseases," she said.

"Parents who don't immunise their children put them at risk – as well as the children of other people."

Almost 250,000 children and their families have taken action to ensure they meet the immunisation requirements since the Government introduced the *No Jab, No Pay* policy in 2016.

The Government provided more than \$14 million in the 2017-18 Budget for free catch-up vaccinations for children, young adults and newly-arrived refugees.

It also provided \$5.5 million over three years to encourage Australian parents and carers to vaccinate their children.

Exemptions still apply for children who have medical contraindications or natural immunity and have been assessed by a general practitioner.

### **Record funding and better outcomes for Durack students**

#### 31 January 2109

As the 2019 school year is about to begin in Western Australia, Federal Member for Durack and Minister for the Environment Melissa Price said students in Durack would benefit from a record \$31.9 billion in Federal Government funding for schools in WA and an agreed national commitment to improve student outcomes.

Minister Price said every state and territory had signed on to the Coalition Government's National School Reform Agreement which will unlock record funding for schools in Durack.

"The Federal Government will provide a record \$31.9 billion in recurrent funding to schools in WA from 2018 to 2029," she said.

"Our record funding will flow to state schools, Catholic schools and Independent schools in our community and the Coalition Government can pay for this record school funding because we are keeping the economy strong.

"Just as importantly, we are ensuring this record funding is matched with record reform to improve how we educate our kids, with more support for teachers and a focus on students learning the core basics of literacy and numeracy.

"The agreement signed with the WA Government sets out the concrete actions we will undertake to improve student outcomes and better support teachers in the Durack electorate," said Minister Price.

One of the key initiatives will be the creation of a single student identifier that will follow a student through their school education, and even across state borders, allowing the collation and analysis of comprehensive data to understand how every student is learning and where they need help.

"When it comes to educating the next generation of Australians, the Federal Government believes local schools should not only receive the funding they need, but that they deliver better outcomes for all students to get the education they need to succeed," Minister Price said.

#### Listen

Just being there for someone and offering a listening ear can make a difference.

- 1. Show them that you care and are here to listen to them.
- 2. Have patience, let others talk and don't judge.
- 3. Be reflective by repeating what they have said.
- 4. Keep calm and accept that they may disagree with you.

#### **Provide support**

If the person you're concerned about is in a life threatening situation, or is at risk of harm to themselves or others, call 000.

Getting help early can make a difference. A good place to start is:

- Talk to your GP or someone you trust.
- + Call a support line.
- · Contact a support service.
- · Try the Think Mental Health check-up tool.

They may also need your support while they look for professional help.



CARBON FARMING POSSIBILITIES


Australia began carbon farming in 2011 under the Rudd Governments' Carbon Farming Initiative, which then, under the Abbott Government, morphed into the Emissions Reduction Fund. This has proved to be of great benefit for NSW and QLD pastoralists especially, who have had a windfall approaching \$2 Billion since then. Due to WA legislation, and past State Government policy, WA pastoralists have been locked out of most carbon farming.

Things have started to move in WA though. Back on 18 April 2018, the State Government released a media statement 'Unlocking carbon potential for pastoralists' that announced their rangeland carbon pilot program. The statement said in part: 'The State will back a number of pilot sequestration offset projects by pastoralists, which focus on grazing strategies that increase regeneration of native vegetation and in the process extract carbon dioxide from the atmosphere.' For those who ask the question; 'What is carbon farming?' Plants use carbon dioxide from the atmosphere to grow, so at its most basic level, carbon farming is growing more vegetation and then managing it so that the woody growth, or plant residue, stays in the local environment.

Carbon farming can also mean managing soil, vegetation, water and animals to increase vegetative growth and carbon storage. An example of a specific management system that can be adapted to achieve greater carbon storage (otherwise known as 'sequestration') is cell grazing. Carbon Link is currently operating across the country, with livestock producers, using cell grazing for carbon farming. The company is reporting that some producers will be able to make more from carbon than from their livestock in the near future. Whether you believe in climate change or not, carbon farming represents a, potentially, very good business deal for the use of pastoral land, especially degraded rangeland. Several WA stations have taken up the opportunity to be involved **and so far, in two auctions, 35 WA stations have won contracts from the Federal Government's Emissions Reduction** Fund (ERF) worth around \$60 Million.




All the Greenhouse Gases are going up! Depending on your point of view, this chart may help explain why carbon farming is needed, or not.

In a recently released Reputex report on the potential of carbon farming in WA, see it here: <u>https://www.reputex.com/research-insights/cost-and-availability-of-offsetting-Ing-emissions-in-western-australia/</u>, the case study of Bulga Downs is very instructive in what can be gained.

Bulga Downs is a 780,000 hectare pastoral lease around 340 kilometres north of Kalgoorlie. 100,000 hectares of the lease is going to be used for the carbon project, which once commenced, is expected to generate an annual income of between \$1.1 and \$1.9 million.

The case study goes on to discuss the additional potential of new carbon farming methods that can capture and account more sequestered carbon, and how the price of carbon is expected to increase into the future. For those who can engage in rangeland carbon farming, the future seems very, very good.



What we have to look forward to. The increase in average is small, but the increase in hot and extreme hot weather is large. This will have a proportional effect on cattle production.

But, there is a large number of pastoralists who are cut out of carbon farming due to the length of their leases. In order to meet the '*range of eligibility criteria and relevant State and Commonwealth legislative requirements'* (see the above referenced media statement), from the commencement of a carbon project, a lease needs a minimum of 25 years to run on their pastoral lease.

With the first WA rangeland carbon farming projects commencing from July 2019, currently 107 stations are ineligible due to short lease length, and as time goes on, more and more pastoral leases will be cut out of a potentially useful business activity.

To add to this restriction, WA pastoralists have no option of undertaking a 100 year carbon project which gives you 20% more income. From the Federal Governments web site: <u>http://www.cleanenergyregulator.gov.au/ERF/Choosing-a-project-type/Opportunities-for-the-land-sector/Permanence-obligations</u> '*If you choose the 25 year option, there will be a* 20 per cent reduction in the number of ACCUs issued for your project.'

There are policy solutions to the issue of lease length and 100 year project length, let's hope that Government can sort out the issues and support the rangeland carbon farming industry that's bringing new income and employment to the rangelands.

This project is supported by funding from the Western Australian Government's State Natural Resource Management Program.



### Remote School Attendance Strategy helping kids get back to school

### in Durack

Schools across Australia have returned for another year with around 14,000 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students supported to attend school through the Coalition Government's successful Remote School Attendance Strategy (RSAS), including across 10 locations in the Durack electorate.

Minister for Indigenous Affairs, Nigel Scullion, said RSAS has achieved a lot in the last five years since it was established by the Coalition Government in 2014, getting more children to attend school, creating almost 500 remote jobs and bringing a new focus to school attendance.

"The Coalition Government made school attendance a key priority when it was elected in 2013 and RSAS has increased attendance rates in 84 communities in remote parts of the country," Minister Scullion said.

"Over the next three years, we will work with communities to support more Indigenous children to attend school including through a stronger focus on case management with families and communities and an increase in local decision making."

Federal Member for Durack and Minister for the Environment Melissa Price said the RSAS is making a real difference in Durack, where local teams support communities at Carnarvon, Newman, Meekatharra, Roebourne, Wiluna, Balgo, Derby, Fitzroy Crossing, Halls Creek and Kalumburu, to find what works best for them to improve attendance and education outcomes.

"Every community in Australia is different. Each has different cultures, strengths, aspirations and needs, as well as different services and infrastructure," Minister Price said.

"Through the RSAS, we employ local people as school attendance officers and supervisors to help families take a lead role in their children's education and deliver local solutions to support students to attend or return to school.

"I am pleased to share that the Coalition Government will invest more than \$11.3 million in Durack, extending RSAS through to December, 2021," she said.

The Strategy does not replace state and territory government responsibility for education attendance and performance and will continue to work with schools, communities, families and students, to further improve school attendance and ensure Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students have access to a quality education.

The investment in Durack is part of the Government's \$78.4 million commitment to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students and their families living in 84 remote communities across Australia.

The Strategy does not replace state and territory government responsibility for education attendance and performance and will continue to work with schools, communities, families and students, to further improve school attendance and ensure Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students have access to a quality education.

Minister Scullion said Labor did not take action on addressing remote school attendance when they were in Government and have not committed to supporting RSAS and the local jobs it provides.


"This means that the jobs for 500 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander school attendance officers are at risk ahead of the upcoming Federal election.

"The Coalition Government believes that every child, no matter where they live, deserves an education as the foundation to a successful life. We will do everything we can to ensuring families and communities are sending their children to school," Minister Scullion said.

## A smoky seafood paella recipe

### Ingredients

- 2 tbsp. olive oil
- 80g chorizo, sliced
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, finely sliced
- 2 Romano peppers, chopped
- 1 tbsp. smoked sweet paprika
- 1 tbsp. tomato purée
- 250g Waitrose Bomba Paella Rice
- 800ml chicken stock
- 180g pack raw Waitrose Extra Large King Prawns
- 2 x 200g packs Waitrose Scottish Mussels
- 25g pack flat leaf parsley, leaves roughly chopped

## Method

Heat the oil in a large frying pan or paella pan and cook the chorizo for 3 minutes then stir in the onion and cook for a few minutes more. Add the garlic and peppers and cook for 2 minutes.

Stir in the paprika and tomato purée and cook for 1 minute then add the rice and toss well. Pour in the stock, bring to a simmer, cover and cook for 10 minutes then add the prawns and mussels and cook for a further 5 minutes until the prawns have turned pink.

By now the rice should be nearly cooked through and absorbed almost all of the liquid. Turn off

#### SALTED CARAMEL CHEESECAKE SANDWICHES



#### INGREDIENTS

- 2 X 200G PACKETS SUGARED LATTICE BIS-CUITS+
- 750G CREAM CHEESE, SOFTENED
- 1 CUP (175G) BROWN SUGAR
- 1 TABLESPOON GOLDEN SYRUP
- 1 TABLESPOON VANILLA EXTRACT
- 3 EGGS
- 1 TEASPOON SEA SALT FLAKES

#### METHOD

- Preheat oven to 150°C (300°F). Place half the lattice biscuits, sugar-side down, in the base of a 20cm x 30cm slice tin lined with non-stick baking paper and set aside. Place the cream cheese, sugar, golden syrup and vanilla in an electric mixer and beat for 4–6 minutes or until smooth and the sugar is dissolved. Add the eggs and beat to combine. Add the salt and mix to combine.
- 2. Spoon the mixture into the slice tin and tap to remove any bubbles. Top with remaining lattice biscuits, sugar-side up, and bake for 50 minutes or until the cheesecake is just set. Allow to cool slightly before refrigerating for 1 hour or until cold. Slice into sandwiches to serve. Serves 8–10.

"I'd rather have a talking frog than a princess any day!"






