

COUNCILNEWS

<u>CEO Update</u>

Firstly welcome to another year, I trust that all concerned had a very enjoyable festive period. I got back to work on the 4th of January 2022 after my break. On the 6th of January representatives from the Shires of Carnarvon and Ashburton undertook a site visit of the proposed Hastings route. Although there is a lot of work to do to make the route into a type 3 sustainable road I was surprised by the overall condition of the roads. The majority of the work in the first instance will need to be done in the Shire of Carnarvon with some re-sheeting in the Ashburton section. On the evening of the 6th of January I was advised that there were fires in the Woodleigh/Meedo and Winderie areas. These fires quickly grew and spread with Winderie Homestead coming under threat. DFES officially took control of the fires on the 7th of January and a lot of resources were brought in to assist with cutting fire breaks and back burning. Sean, Thomas and I assisted DFES with some of the on-the-ground work along with THEM Earthmoving who provided graders and operators to help with the firefighting efforts. Personally I would like to thank Sean for his efforts as he was all over this event working through the weekends and cutting his annual leave short. Once again we need to recognise the efforts of Waddy providing us with aerial surveillance.

Corporate Services Update

The Corporate team have returned to work after a much needed break, ready to face new adventures in 2022! We were not left disappointed as we came back to fires, fires and more fires! These recent events have certainly kept staff on their toes, particularly Sean, John, Thomas and Cherie who along with many volunteers worked tirelessly with officers from DFES to keep the fires under control. We recognise the efforts of everyone involved and would like to say a huge "thank you" to all of these great people who helped to keep our community safe!! Well done!

With the first half of the financial year behind us we look forward to consolidating projects leading into the final half of 2021/22. We will also start preparing work on our draft budget for 22/23 as well as the interim financial audit that we have tentatively scheduled in the April/May period.



The CRC are happy to announce the successful delivery of the Annual Gascoyne Junction Community Christmas Event for another consecutive year. The 2021 event was held on the 16th December at the pavilion, hosted to a large crowd of local residents, extended community members and visitors alike.

Works and Services Report

Another year has begun and we have hit the ground running. I would firstly like to thank Sean Walker for filling in for me while I enjoyed some much needed leave with my family. Sean did a great job dealing with the fires within the shire and ensuring we were ready to fire up for 2022. This has given Sean a good insight the role as Works Manager.

The works crew have mobilised to Landor to begin the 5km new seal project. We will begin prepping the subgrade and importing the new base course this month. I met with the Burringurrah Community in December and they have given us their support to carry out the works on both Landor Meekatharra Road and Landor Mount Augustus Road. Once the new seal is complete we have approximately 4km of resheeting to do on Landor Mount Augustus Road.

Our maintenance graders have completed grading the Carnarvon Shire's section of the Pimbee Road. This has been a long time coming and has been welcomed by our residents and pastoralists in that area. We hope that this is the start of an ongoing initiative with the Carnarvon Shire when required.

It looks like 2022 will be another very busy year and we are looking forward to the challenges that lay ahead.



Vance passes close to Gascoyne Junction

THE eye of cyclone Vance passed within two kilometres of the small town of Gascoyne Junction about 10pm, Monday.

Gascoyne Junction Hotel caretaker Guy Russell said he could see the moon in the eye of the storm.

"There was a circular area with no clouds about two kilometres away," he said.

The cyclone had been downgraded to a category three by the time it passed over Gascoyne Junction but still carried enough force to unroof two houses and drop 154mm of rain.

Gascoyne Junction Shire chief executive John Newton said about nine people slept at the town hall during the night of the storm.

The next concern for the town was the rising river level.

A levee bank was formed in front of the hotel and some residents were evacuated from the north side of the river to the town.







Citrus Salad with Champagne Dressing

Ingredients For the Salad

Blood orange

Orange

Lime

Avocado

Goats feta

Mint leaves

For the Champagne Dressing

1/3 cup Champagne vinegar

1 Clove garlic, crushed

2 tsp Lemon juice

¼ cup Olive oil

Salt to taste

Method

Arrange your rocket leaves, and sliced orange, blood orange, and lime, over a salad dish. I sliced the rind off my citrus fruits to create a hexagonal effect. Add avocado cubes and feta, and sprinkle over some mint leaves.

For the champagne dressing, combine the vinegar, garlic, lemon juice, and olive oil. Add salt to taste.

Pour your dressing over the salad just before serving.

Strawberry Cheesecake Tart

Ingredients

For the Crust

1 1/3 cups plain flour

¼ cup caster sugar

1/2 tsp salt

150g melted butter

For the Filling ¹/₂ cup thickened cream

500g cream cheese

½ cup caster sugar

1 lemon, juiced

1tsp vanilla essence

For the Topping

Approx. 15 strawberries, thinly sliced

3 tbsp strawberry jam

2 tsp water



Method

1. Heat oven to 180 Celsius. Combine all ingredients for the crust, and mix until they form a dough. Press into the base and up the sides of your tart tin. Use a fork to prick holes across the base of your crust, then bake for 20-30 minutes, or until golden. Allow to cool.

2. Using a hand mixer, beat together all ingredients for the filling. Pour over cooled crust.

3. Layer strawberry slices over the top of the cream cheese filling.Add jam and water to a small bowl and warm in a microwave for20 seconds. Stir to combine, then brush the jam glaze over thestrawberry layer.

4. Refrigerate for two hours before serving.

Southern Rangelands Revitalisation Pilot kicks off in the Upper Gascoyne

Wednesday, 23 February 2022

The McGowan Government has unveiled the successful applicants for the groundbreaking Southern Rangelands Revitalisation Pilot project to drive land and business rejuvenation in the southern pastoral estate.

16 stations will participate in the innovative pilot program, which will develop individual roadmaps to revive rangeland conditions, while building business resilience.

The group of pastoralists - nine from the Murchison, three from the Gascoyne; Jimba Jimba, Dairy Creek and Cary Downs and four from the Goldfields-Nullarbor - will explore a range of options and opportunities as part of the peer learning group.

Participants' plans for their management systems include rest-based grazing, developing mobile watering points to reduce grazing pressure, re-establishing landscape water flow to encourage vegetation growth, the use of Internet of Things devices to monitor remote trap yards and irrigating native rangeland grass seedbeds.

The program will be tailored to the needs of the group, drawing on the experts on land and grazing management, as well as business coaching and mentoring.

The \$550,000 Southern Rangelands Revitalisation Pilot project is one of the McGowan Government's initiatives to build long-term climate and business resilience, alongside the Western Australia Carbon Farming and Land Restoration Program and the Farm Business Resilience Program.

Agriculture and Food Minister Alannah MacTiernan shared that the Southern Rangelands Revitalisation Pilot project provides a hands-on approach to building long-term sustainability and business resilience for stations across the regions. Pastoralists in the southern rangelands have been exposed to the impacts of climate change, so it is important they are well equipped with the latest advances in land management strategies and technologies to optimise station operations.

The successful pastoralists bring a range of proposals to the table, which they will develop over the course of the program with the support of their peers and experts to boost rangeland regeneration and business opportunities. This foundation work will ensure pastoral enterprises progress the proposals on the ground, transforming the rangelands landscape and the productive potential of this important part in Western Australia.



PROJECT UPDATE 3 February 2022

HASTINGS TECHNOLOGY METALS

HASTINGS Technology Metals Ltd is a leading Australian rare earths company (ASX:HAS).

Hastings' flagship Yangibana Rare Earths Project is in Western Australia's Gascoyne north east of Carnarvon.

Uniquely, Yangibana is endowed with the world's highest composition of Neodymium and Praseodymium (NdPr), which are vital in the manufacture of permanent magnets used in electric vehicles, wind turbines, robotics, medical applications and digital services.

Hastings is primed to become the world's next producer of NdPr, and Australia's second rare earths project; and is actively fostering a lower carbon future and renewable energy solutions.

The rare earth (RE) ore will be mined, crushed, milled and processed into a RE concentrate at the Yangibana site and then hauled 450kms to a hydrometallurguical plant in the Pilbara for further processing to a Mixed Rare Earth Carbonate (MREC) and then shipped to global customers.

NEXT STEPS

Hastings plans to commence the 24-month construction of Yangibana in 2022 following

- Finalisation of debt financing.
- Finalisation of capital expenditure validation and equity funding.
- Finalisation of approvals.

Hastings is focused on bringing the Project into production in 2024. NAIF Approves \$140m Loan for Yangibana, 2 February 2022

The Federal Government's Northern Australia Infrastructure Facility (NAIF) has approved a \$140 million loan, underpinning finalisation of remaining funding for the development of Yangibana.

The NAIF loan is aligned with Australia's Critical Mineral Strategy and the State Government's Future Battery Industry Strategy.

"This is the Commonwealth's first financing package for construction of a rare earths mine and production plant in Australia and it supports the rapid development world wide of decarbonisation technologies in e-mobility and in energy production," Charles Lew Hastings' Chairman said.

"Hastings is proud to be at the forefront of this significant global transition to a lower carbon future and aims to be part of the global efforts toward sustainability."



STATUS

Hastings is undertaking early site works (access roads, communications, village, airstrip and water) at Yangibana which are scheduled to be completed this year, and in advance of the start of construction of both the on-site beneficiation plant and the hydrometallurgical plant near Onslow.

In parallel, Hastings is focusing on securing the remaining equity and debt financing for construction.

Shaping Gascoyne Junction's Future Energy System

Horizon Power is committed to delivering reliable and safe energy to our customers. We are striving to make that energy supply an increasingly cleaner and greener service for our communities.

To provide a future energy system that reflects the values of its community, we have introduced a new process known as Integrated Resource Planning (IRP). The IRP process is about engaging with our communities and stakeholders to look at ways that we can introduce a new energy system that considers their needs.

The insights and feedback we receive from the Gascoyne Junction community will be taken into consideration when shortlisting the solutions, and we will keep the community updated as the pathway to a renewable future is revealed.






