# **CEO Report**

Firstly welcome to the new financial year.W ith 2021/22 fast disappearing in the rear view mirror, it now means our attention turns to the 22/23 budget, audit, end of year reports and the like which is a busy time for all concerned.

The Two Rivers Memorial Park is still progressing with the rock wall, kerbing and stone pitching now being completed. Work is continuing with the concrete paths and these should be finished in early August. The lawn will be laid in mid to late August with all electrical and plumbing also completed.

The Budget process continues, we are waiting for the opening and closing balances to settle down as this has a major bearing on the overall budget position and will ultimately determine what projects we will be able to get up.

I have a meeting in Carnarvon on the 28th of July to attend the second round of consultation for the Cultural Heritage Act. At this stage it appears that no much change has happened within the various tiers of works. I will be accompanied by key staff members to this event to ensure that a well rounded viewpoint for the Shire is developed in this consultation stage.

Councillor McTaggart, Jarrod Walker and myself attended the Zone and RRG Meeting held in Shark Bay. Nothing specifically to report but it was an interesting affair.

The Shire have been offered the Shearing Equipment from Mooka Station, which we have gratefully accepted, to go on display once we have found a suitable space in which to display it. This will fit in with the Cobra Wool Press which is being sourced in the next month or so. One of the Shires residents, Mr Will Baston, has been pre-selected by the Liberal Party to run in the forth-coming North West By-Election.

DRFAWA have approved our claim for the flood damaged roads occurring in March and April of this year. The initial estimate is approximately \$10.5 million. I have a meeting with the Minister of Emergency Management, Hon. Stephen Dawson, on Saturday the 6thof August to discuss some of the issues we have with the current requirements under DRFAWA

# **Corporate Services Update**

I am pleased to report that the review process of our Interim Audit with William Buck is finished, if Council recall as per previous reports our interim audit had to be conducted offsite as the Auditors could not attend in person. Our audit file is currently sitting with the OAG pending their final review and sign off. I am hopeful this will be completed by the end of July.

The Corporate team have been kept busy with our End of Financial Year (EOFY) processes and as we wrapped these up for another year, I moved on to completing the annual performance reviews for my staff. We are trialling a new format for the reviews whereby we have conducted them in bulk for my team this year, instead of aligning them with the officer's anniversary date. This change has meant the process is more streamlined and all officers are due to have their performance review done at the same time. We have also introduced a new form template, which gives individual officers more opportunity to assess their own performance and provide feedback about areas where they have exceled and those that need improvement.

The new process has been very helpful for me as the Line Manager because it gives me real insight into how my staff are faring in their role and how they feel about working for the Shire.

CRC Conference

In early June Billie and I attended the 2022 CRC Conference in Mandurah with a theme based around being Agents for Change by using Technology and Innovation in Regional Settings.

A strong focus was placed on the Western Australia Digital Strategy and the role of CRC's in implementing the policy into communities across the State. With a panel of guests speakers from State Government, NBN, DPIRD, Office of Digital Government, WA Aust Cyber and the Regional Tech Hub it was a wonderful chance to speak to the challenges of how we can continue to be agents for change delivering better services, providing our community with information to make informed decisions about being online, how to be safe and secure online and making our community digitally inclusive. Seeing programs run by other CRCs across the state was thought provoking and it was a wonderful opportunity to network and make connections

# Library Grant

We have been successful in the State Library Technology and Digital Inclusion Grant again this year with a range of digital tools including sound recording equipment, video recording equipment and a 3D Printer to build upon the new computers purchased last year through the grant being added to the digital tools available at the CRC.In the coming months the CRC will be hosting learning opportunities in the fields of photo and movie editing and also using 3D printers for pastoralists.A local history project will also be undertaken using these new digital tools.The CRC will really be the Upper Gascoyne Technology Hub.

# **Events**

The CRC hosted another COVID and Flu Vaccination Clinic at the beginning of June, with another scheduled for August 5.On June 10, a successful Bogan Bingo event was well attended with guests travelling from Geraldton and Carnarvon to attend. The Admin Team did an incredible job of pulling this event together again after having to postpone at the last minute in April due to road closures. The Biggest Morning Tea held in the CRC in conjunction with the last Council Meeting raised \$461.15 for the Cancer Council.

# **Tourism Update**

Media Visit

In early June, both the Western 4WD Magazine, Hema Maps and Guru TV Productions visited the Shire of Upper Gascoyne creating content on the Kennedy Loop Track, Gascoyne Junction, Kennedy Range National Park and Mount Augustus. Two stories went to air on Sunday July 10 on Channel 9 on the show Outdoor Destinations. The stories are in the second episode of the series and am happy with 99% of what went to air. There are a couple of key messages that were misconstrued on screen however, overall a great showcase of the region. The episodes remain on 9 Now for follow up viewing until early September with a minimum of 4 repeats guaranteed across Channel 9 stations over the next few months.

# Walking Tours and Visitor Feedback:

Our walking tours have been taking off over the past month averaging two to three a week. Monday, Tuesday and Friday seem to be the optimum days.

We are getting great feedback from our guests who have enjoyed the experience and feel that they have left with a better understanding of life in the Upper Gascoyne. June and July have seen increasing visitor numbers into the Visitor Centre and we are receiving positive feedback on our roads, the appearance of the town, the service, amenities and hospitality at the pub and the friendly locals. The National Parks exceed expectation and guests are leaving happy.

# Marketing and Social Media Strategy

New content is still being loaded to the Shire webpage especially in regards to Tourism Content. The Shire Facebook page is used to communicate community and Shire news and events to its 2.8K followers. It is a source for council news, event updates, public notices from the Shire and other Government departments, to communicate road closures and weather events and general Shire news. The Shire Instagram page is growing in audience and is aimed at visitors to the Shire with images and messages designed around building awareness of our brand, location and creating a desire to visit the Shire. This will be further built upon in coming months with the new content created from our recent media visit.

This new content will also be used through the Shire You Tube page which has been set up with two audiences. One to communicate council meetings as required to meet LGA requirements, and the second demographic is for visitors seeking information on our region, to build a desire to visit the region.

# Sponsorships

# **Manager of Works and Services Report**

We are having another red hot crack at WA's Tidy Town's awards again this year with the town crew returning from annual leave. It is great to have plenty of visitors commenting on how nice the town is looking... well done team.

The town oval is already reaping the benefits of being aerated and the pleasant weather, the remaining reticulation upgrades will be completed in August/September when the turf is laid at the Two Rivers Memorial Park.

The Council chamber upgrade is 95% complete. The carpet has been laid and the concrete surrounds at the front of the building have been poured to stop water ingress. The painters will return to complete the final touches.

I have been busy seeking quotes for our new plant and equipment purchases, we are hoping to lock in suppliers early on in the case there is a delay or shortage in availability.

Frank Drayton has resigned in his role as our all-round operator. I would like to thank Frank for his contribution over the three and a bit years working for the shire. Frank has worked in various capacities within the shire for the past 15 years and will be sorely missed. I wish him all the best in his next chapter. We have advertised to fill his role with applications closing at the end of July.

We engaged Lance Root with his newly formed business ABBL Contracting to erect new signage along the Cobra Gifford Creek Rd.Lance is returning at the end of July to install new concrete grid abutments on the Carnarvon Mullewa road, grid cleanouts and signage throughout the shire. They will also be retrieving the old wool press for preservation from the Cobra wool shed.

The maintenance graders have finally caught up with repairing damage from earlier weather events and driver this year. Thomas and Ian have completed opening up Pingandy Road for the fourth time this year and will now return to normal maintenance grading. Thomas will concentrate on our southern side while Ian is over on our eastern side of the shire.

# **Capital Works**

Thanks to Main Roads WA we received \$2.5M to upgrade a section of the Carnarvon Mullewa Road. THEM Earthmoving have completed upgrading 8km worth of alignment and drainage and sealed 6km up to the Pells Range. The installation of new culverts out to SLK 82 is also complete and leaves us in a good position to lobby for more funding to continue sealing east.

I am pleased to announce that the shire road works crew have successfully completed all of our 2021-22 works program. All of our projects were completed within budget with the exception of the Carnarvon Mullewa seal works going over due to several weather events prolonging the sealing. Works completed in 2021-22 included:

- ·13 km ofupgrades to seal standard on Carnarvon Mullewa Road
- ·4.2 km of upgrades to seal standard on Landor Meekatharra Road
- ·3.5 km of re-sheeting and 25 km reforming of road on Landor Meekatharra Rd





New bitumen seal and rock protection on Landor Meekatharra Road

We have been gearing up to start our 2022-23 works campaign. We expect to continue the bitumen upgrades on Landor Meekatharra road in the last week of July. We will aim to complete a further 4.8km of seal by the end of October. This year's other projects include 8km of resheeting on Carnarvon Mullewa Road between Congo and Daurie Creek, lowering and improving Blackspot crest at Mount Sandiman.

#### Landor Meekatharra Rd

Completed all works on this road comprising heavy reshaping, removal of silt and reconstruction of unsealed floodways. The works also repaired the sealed floodway at Errabiddy.

#### Landor Mt Augustus Rd

Completed works on this road, working from Burringurrah south towards Landor homestead. Works include heavy grade to pavement gravel, reinstatement of road shoulder, pavement gravel re-sheet, silt removal and reinstatement of unsealed floodway pavement.

#### Meekatharra Mt Clere Rd

Completed works on this road working from the Meekatharra boundary towards Mt Clere homestead. Works include heavy grading of scours on the pavement.

#### Landor Mt Clere Rd

Completed works on this road from Mt Clere homestead working west. Works include minor and medium silt/debris removal from subgrade and pavement, reform subgrade, heavy grading to the pavement, silt removal and reinstatement of unsealed floodway pavement.

#### Waldburg Rd

Completed defect repair works on this road, working from the Waldburg Homestead south towards Landor Mt Clere Rd. Works include heavy grade to gravel pavement, shoulder reinstatement, drain silt and debris removal, re-sheeting of pavement gravel and reinstatement of unsealed floodway pavement.

## Ullawarra Road - Bundagee Wash

The Contractor has provided pricing for the flood damage reinstatement works and betterment works (concrete cutoff wall and additional rock protection and grouting) at the Bundagee Wash. Unfortunately the pricing was significantly higher than the original estimate. Alternative pricing has been requested from THEM. Depending on the alternative price, the betterment works may or may not be able to be completed.

All defects for this AGRN951 are complete with the exception being the Ullawarra Bundagee wash bitumen seal defect repair. The works are planned to be completed in August before the next Downer bitumen campaign.

# Works this period (July 2022)

### Carnarvon Mullewa Rd

Funding for this project is grant-funded to the value of \$2.5M to cover the costs of project management, engineering design, survey, geotechnical testing, earthworks, drainage and bitumen spray seal.

The earthworks commenced from the current extent of the existing bitumen pavement at SLK74.5. Construction activities include survey set-out, minor clearing, foundation preparation of subgrade, cut-to-fill, gravel borrow-to-fill, compaction, and trimming.

All clearing from Slk 74.5 - 81.6 complete

# Subgrade

All subgrade from Slk 74.5 – 80.25 complete

# Drainage

All floodways and culverts between Slk 74.5 – 80.17 complete



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# New School for Gascoyne Junction

Gascoyne Junction will once again have its own school next year after closure of the previous school almost 10 years ago, Education and Training Minister Alan Carpenter announced today.

Speaking in Parliament, Mr Carpenter said the school would reopen in time for the start of the 2005 school year with its own principal and teacher. The \$450,000 include two classrooms, facilities would administration block, a library area and a toilet block. "The Gallop Government is committed to providing schools where schools are needed," the Minister said. \*The old school building, which has since been the site for the Gascoyne Junction Education Centre, is beyond repair and will be demolished to make way for the \$450,000 facilities. "It is an exciting time for the Gascoyne Junction community, who have been united and very passionate about the growing need for a school in the town to meet the educational needs of their children from Kindergarten to Year 10." Mr Carpenter said the provision of better education infrastructure was part of the State Government's strategy to increase school retention rates in the State by improving the delivery of education in remote communities. The Minister said the original Gascoyne Junction school was closed in December, 1994 by the previous government. "Gascoyne Junction now has 16 school-aged children of indigenous and non-indigenous backgrounds in the community and improved school facilities are essential,"

he said. "The number of students is expected to rise further due to increased housing construction already under way in the area. "Moreover, some families have not taken up the available Aboriginal housing due to the lack of a school and we believe some Aboriginal families will return to the area when the school reopens." Mr Carpenter said the current education program being accessed through distance education, while appreciated by the community, did not meet their expectations for the education of their children. 'Students of primary age are currently educated at the Gascoyne Junction Education Centre by accessing programs from the Carnaryon School of the Air and the secondary students through the School of Isolated and Distance Education," he said. "Staff from the School of the Air have regular radio contact and visit Gascoyne Junction twice a term to assist students with their studies. "However, they do not stay overnight because of lack of accommodation. "An education assistant, who is the local policeman's wife, works with the students on a daily basis. "While this has provided some educational continuity for the students and their families, there is no long-term guarantee of a competent education assistant being available in the future. "The current situation clearly does not provide the best possible education program for the number of students at Gascoyne Junction." The Minister said the Shire of Gascoyne Junction and the Department of Education and Training would provide housing accommodation for the principal and teacher.

#### Dear parents and carers

Throughout the pandemic, Western Australian public, Catholic and Independent schools have worked together to provide COVID-safe measures across our schools to help keep our students, staff and community safe.

As Western Australian COVID-19 infections are rising and new sub-variants are leading to reinfections for people who have already had COVID-19, we are asking for your support to ensure we keep our schools open and minimise disruption to student learning.

It is vital we continue to keep ourselves and our school community safe.

As endorsed by National Cabinet as part of a nationally consistent approach, wearing masks indoors is strongly encouraged and we fully support this across our three school systems. We ask that your child wears a mask to school to keep our schools as safe as possible. Staff have also been strongly encouraged to wear a mask while at school.

We ask for your support to please explain to your child the importance of wearing a mask to reduce the risk of transmission in schools and the community.

You can support your school community to be COVID-19 safe by:

- wearing a mask indoors when visiting the school
- ensuring your family stays up-to-date with COVID-19 and flu vaccines
- testing your child for COVID-19 if they have symptoms or are a household close contact
- · keeping your child home if they are unwell
- maintaining good hand hygiene.

To further support face-to-face learning and minimise disruption to students' schooling, the WA Government will again be providing 20 free Rapid Antigen Tests (RATs) for each student. Your school will be able to provide you with further information in the coming weeks on how you can collect these once they receive their allocation.

Testing for COVID-19 remains an important step in keeping our more vulnerable community members safe. If your child is a close contact and does not have symptoms, they must return daily negative RATs to leave isolation and attend school, and must also wear a mask when outside their home (usual exemptions apply), as per the <u>testing and isolation protocols</u>. Close contacts who have symptoms should not attend school.

Thank you for your continued efforts in working together to keeping all Western Australian schools COVID-19 safe.

# Foot-and-mouth disease: keep Australia free

Western Australia exports about 80% of its livestock and livestock products annually. Access to these markets depends on Australia being free of foot-and-mouth disease.

# What is foot-and-mouth disease?

Foot-and-mouth disease is a highly infectious viral disease that affects clovenhoofed (two-toed) animals including sheep, cattle, pigs, goats, buffalo, camels, alpaca, llama and deer.

Affected animals may survive foot-andmouth disease, but they take a long time to recover and often do not regain their full productivity. Surviving animals may also become carriers of the virus.

Foot-and-mouth disease could enter Australia by:

- illegally imported meat and dairy products being fed to pigs
- people returning from overseas with the virus on clothing, footwear or equipment.

# What would an outbreak mean?

Western Australia exports about 80% of its livestock and livestock products every year. An outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease would result in:

- closure of livestock export markets
- severe economic impact on the livestock industries and regional communities
- a cost of more than \$52 billion over 10 years.

# What can you do?

- Reduce the risk of an outbreak:
  - Do not feed meat, swill or any other prohibited feeds to pigs.
  - Ensure overseas visitors to your farm wear clean clothes and disinfected shoes.
- Know the signs of foot-and-mouth disease.
- Immediately report any signs of footand-mouth disease to a vet.

# Early reporting is key

Recognising and reporting foot-and-mouth disease early can help to contain its spread. Minimising spread will reduce the devastating economic and social costs of an outbreak to producers, the livestock industries (including abattoirs, saleyards, stock agents and transporters) and regional and national economy.

To report signs of the disease, call the:

- emergency animal disease hotline on 1800 675 888 or
- your Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) vet or
- · your private vet.

# How does foot-and-mouth disease spread?

Foot-and-mouth disease is highly contagious. The virus is present in large amounts in the blisters, saliva, urine, manure, milk and breath of infected animals.

The virus spreads between animals by:

- direct contact with an infected animal
- air-borne particles from infected animals
- movement of infected animals
- movement of contaminated animal products (such as wool or manure), vehicles, equipment and people.

The virus can survive in the environment for several weeks. Virus particles can remain in people's noses for up to 24 hours.

Animals usually show signs of foot-andmouth disease within 3–5 days of infection, but signs can take up to 14 days to appear. Infected animals spread the virus before they show signs of the disease.

# Signs of foot-and-mouth disease

Signs of foot-and-mouth disease vary depending on the species infected and the virus strain. Signs of the disease include:

- blisters in the mouth, nostrils, teats or on the skin between and above the hoofs.
   (Blisters may not be obvious until they have ruptured.)
- slobbering/drooling
- lameness, reluctance to move
- lack of appetite
- reduced productivity
- sudden death in young animals
- a large drop in milk yield in dairy animals
- abortion in pigs.

In sheep, blisters are usually small and often difficult to see. The signs are often mild and lameness may be the only visible sign.

To report suspicious disease signs, call the:

- EAD hotline on 1800 675 888 or
- your DPIRD or private vet.

#### **Chinese Chicken Fried Rice**

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 4 ½ cups cooked jasmine rice day old, see Notes for amount of uncooked rice
- ½ lb boneless skinless chicken thighs thinly sliced
- 1 shallot finely chopped
- 3 cloves garlic minced
- ¾ cup carrot finely diced
- ½ cup peas frozen
- 3 eggs beaten4 tsp vegetable oil or any neutral tasting oil

#### **Chicken Marinade:**

- 1 tsp regular soy sauce not light or dark soy sauce!
- 1 tsp Shaoxing Cooking Wine or sub with Dry Sherry Wine
- 1 tsp cornstarch
- 1 tsp vegetable oil

#### Sauce:

- 2 tbsp regular soy sauce not light or dark soy sauce!
- ½ tbsp dark soy sauce
- 2 tsp sesame oil
- 1 tsp chicken bouillon powder aka. Chicken instant stock mix½ tsp white pepper or sub with black pepper





#### **Chinese Chicken Fried Rice**

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

- 1. .Marinate your sliced chicken for 5 minutes. Remove from heat and set aside.
- 2. In a bowl, pre-mix sauce ingredients as listed. Set aside.
- 3. In a hot wok set over medium high heat, add 1 tsp oil. Once oil is hot, fry chicken until fully cooked. Remove and set aside.
- 4. Add 1 tsp of oil and fry garlic and shallots for 10 seconds or until softened. Quickly add peas and carrots and fry for another 10 seconds or until softened. Push everything to the side of the wok.
- 5. Add 1 tsp of oil into empty space of wok. Pour in eggs and scramble before mixing with ingredients in wok.
- 6. Add remaining oil along with rice and toss with ingredients. Toss back in chicken.
- 7. Pour sauce around your rice along the edges of the wok (the heat + sauce creates more flavour vs. pouring on top of rice). Mix until all rice granules are coloured brown. Remove off heat. Serve and enjoy!

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




