Dear Readers

I have attended my first meeting with the District Health Advisory Council. As I am strongly advocating for the reinstatement of the Doctors service in Gascoyne Junction. Unfortunately representatives of CMSAC and other agencies were not in attendance so I couldn't deliver my message to the on the ground service providers.

I am currently working with DFES (OEM) to establish a model for Local Governments to demonstrate the condition of their roads prior to a proclaimed event. This is very challenging given that we are dealing with both the Federal and State Governments and in particular their Audit requirements. This is holding up the processing of our latest claim as they wanted pictorial evidence of the condition of the roads prior to the proclaimed event, we do have pictorial evidence on most of our roads but not all and in particular Pimbee Road.

Purely from a personal Health perspective I can report that I have had treatment on Friday the 28th of June 2019, I also had the opportunity to catch up with the Oncologist to discuss the results of the CAT scan taken the previous fortnight. It was somewhat inconclusive my primary organs such as the Brain, Lungs, Kidneys, Neck, Lymph Nodes, Bladder are all normal, however, there are two small shadows on the Liver, the Doctor is not sure what these are and has booked me in to get an ultra sound which gives a better picture if these are tumours or some other anomaly. I had this done on Tuesday the 9th of July and had a follow up with the Doctor on the 12th of July to discuss the results and received treatment the same day. If they are suspicious he will arrange for a biopsy to be undertaken and then we will know what we are dealing with. I am not sure what will happen if they are tumours, it will either be a further operation, continue as is and monitor or additional treatment. How quick this happens is in the hands of the Doctor.

Tidy Towns WA visited to judge our little community on 27th July. The judging criteria does not just address the physical appearance of the towns but also what services and resources Local Governments provide to the community and how they engage visitors and locals alike. Amanda and Cherie spent considerable time with the panel answering and demonstrating what we do as a Shire. I am happy to report that the judges were amazed at the level of service we provide considering our staffing and geographical limitations. Fingers crossed we do well this year.

Thomas and Dameon have completed grading the Wanna and Cobra Dairy Creek roads. They are working from Cobra across to the Mount Augustus then down to Landor. Frank and Leeson have repaired damage caused by traffic driving on closed roads on both Pimbee and Carnarvon Mullewa roads.

Prior to this Ray Hoseason Smith helped us out by jumping in a grader on the Ullawarra road while we had good moisture in the ground. Ray has also assisted with readjusting the Glenburgh and Dairy creek intersection directional signs.

Over the next month Dameon will continue grading around the Mount Augustus area while Thomas will return to begin opening up a detour for the Carnarvon Mullewa new bitumen works. Ian Golding began working for us on the 15th July and has kicked off on the Carey Downs road and then onto the Gilroyd road before heading up to the Landor area.

Leeson, Frank and Dave have installed the New Bull Street and information signs as well as event advertising posts in town, also setting up pumps for bitumen works and then prepping pads for two sheds in the depot.

We have decided to push the new bitumen project on Carnarvon Mullewa road back until I return from leave on the 10th of August. This will give us time to set up the dam liner and fence at Mongers and install a detour for traffic.

Unfortunately soil sample results from the Mongers pit were out of spec in regards to linear shrinkage so more testing was done with 0.5% cement, 1% cement and Polycom in the samples. All three samples returned acceptable results however there is a big saving if we use the Polycom. This means we will be able to get more black stuff on the ground. I am budgeting to get approximately 5.6-6km of new seal completed.



COUNCIL NEWS

We have decided to make our plant and equipment purchases early in the new financial year as we are in a good cash flow position. Quotes were sourced for the supply of a new dual cab for the CEO and a space cab to replace one of the grader operators ute. Midway Ford in Midland were successful in securing both vehicles and trading the current CEO vehicle. There was a saving of approximately \$18,000 compared to the nearest quotes.

Requests for quotes for a new grader was posted on the eQuotes portal this month. Prior to this two written quotes were requested from John Deere and Westrac for the supply and delivery of a new grader. Westrac's quote was approximately \$35,000 cheaper and trade in prices for our machine were on par. We then decided to go straight to Westrac through WALGA's Preferred Supplier Portal.

Unfortunately the current mutli tyred roller is having more issues and as such I believe we need to replace it sooner rather than later. I sought quotes from various suppliers for a second hand roller however the current available machines varied greatly in price, condition and suitability. We have requested Council consider the purchase of a new machine rather than second hand as we have capacity within the budget after some small amendments. I have requested quotes for the new roller from Westrac, Conplant and Bomag. The request for quote ended on Monday 15th July with the hope it will be delivered before we start the bitumen project.

Unfortunately on Tuesday 30th July there was an incident where a vehicle rolled over approximately 3Km east from town on the Carnarvon Mullewa road just near Woolcadgie.

Ray and Wendy from Dairy Creek where the first people at the accident, they contacted the relevant authorities being: RFDS and St John, as well as administering required first aid, Series of events from there are as follows;

- 1. St John contacted Dave Higgs as the First respondent (Shire's Emergency Service Coordinator) 0409 840 636,
- 2. Amanda, Bec and Myself arrived at accident with RFDS Medical Box.
- 3. Ian Traveling back to town stopped and stayed to assist.
- 4. Leeson and Spags stopped and asked if assistance is required.
- 5. Peter and Sean arrived with stretcher.
- 6. Between all of us and with the direction by RFDS and St Johns we transported the injured person to the air strip.
- 7. RFDS arrived, shortly after landing the St John ambulance arrived.
- 8. The injured man was flown to Carnarvon Hospital.

During this time first aid care and communications with both RFDS and St John where continual. Special thanks to Ray, Wendy, RFDS, St Johns and all of the other people involved.

We are very fortunate to live in a community where everybody is willing to lend a hand when a situation arises..

To be eligible to vote or nominate for a vacant position in this election you must be on the Electoral Roll or be on the State Electoral Roll.

You can check to see if you are on the State Roll by going to https://www.elections.wa.gov.au If you are not on this roll you can make application to the CEO for the Shire of Upper Gascoyne to be put onto the Owners / Occupiers Roll. This means you may live in another area but own or rent / lease land in the Local Government District or it could mean that you reside in the Local Government Area,

This applies to Mining Tenements, Pastoral Leases,

Commercial / Industrial / Residential Land.

Applications for both the residents and owner/occupiers roll close at 5:00pm on Friday 30 August 2019

For those intending to nominate for a Councillor position the first date you can nominate on the 5th of September 2019.

This has to be done on a prescribed form and must be lodged with the returning officer.

The nomination period is open for 8 days and closes at 4.00pm on the 12th of September 2019.

The Returning Officer for the Shire of Upper Gascoyne is Mrs Amanda Leighton, who will be available at the Shire Office in Gascoyne Junction. All candidates must complete an online candidate induction prior to nominating for election so they are fully aware of what to expect as an elected member and the rules related to campaigning. This will be available on the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries web site. Candidates must also make a deposit of \$80 which is repaid if the candidate receives more than 5% of the vote.

Carnarvon lifts off with a blast at Apollo 11 50th Anniversary celebrations

Putting man on the moon was made possible thanks to the instrumental role Carnarvon played in early space exploration, when it hosted the world's largest tracking station outside of the U.S.

The town of Carnarvon was a buzz last weekend with past Trackers and people connected with the NASA Carnarvon Tracking Station returning to reunite at a cocktail party held at the Carnarvon Space and

Technology Museum to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the Apollo 11 mission, and the achievements of those that worked at the station.

Former Trackers spent time reminiscing, sharing stories and returning to where they lived and socialised, while reconnecting with a community they were once very much a part of and helped shape.

Member for North West Central Vince Catania said "for too long the importance of the contribution made by the NASA Carnarvon Tracking Station has flown under the radar, with many people unaware the historical landing may not have happened had it not been for the pivotal role the Trackers in Carnarvon played."

"The Carnarvon Space and Technology Museum, next to the iconic Dish, has been developed and run entirely by dedicated hard-working volunteers over many years, with great support from the Carnarvon Community, to ensure the story is understood and etched in history."

"An important tourism icon for the town, the State and Australia, the Museum tells the space race story and recognises how vital the site and Trackers were in the success of this mission into space."

"It's a credit to everyone involved, including Phil Youd, an instrumental driver of the project, insisting this important history be preserved and shared for generations to come," said Vince.

"Congratulations must go to everyone involved in the evolution of the Carnarvon Space and Technology Museum and the Apollo 11 50th Anniversary celebrations, recognising the extent of what happen both in Carnarvon and the World fifty years ago – landing on the moon," said Vince.





Entrée & Main Course



Ingredients

- 4 free-range eggs
- 1/3 cup vegetable oil
- 1 small red onion, finely diced
- 1 tsp diced ginger
- 1 tsp diced garlic
- 2 tbsp finely sliced coriander roots and
- 2 rindless bacon rashers, finely diced
- 2 tbsp shao hsing wine, or dry sherry
- 4 cups steamed rice
- 2/3 cup finely sliced spring onions
- 1-2 tbsp light soy sauce
- 1/4 tsp sesame oil

Method

- 1. Break eggs into a bowl and beat lightly. Heat Directions half the oil in a hot wok until surface seems to shimmer slightly. Pour beaten eggs into the wok Step 1 and leave to cook on the base of the wok for 10 seconds before folding egg mixture over onto itself with a spatula and lightly scrambling for about one minute or until almost cooked through. Carefully remove omelette from wok with a spatula and drain on paper towel. Set aside.
- 2. Heat remaining oil in the hot wok and stir fry onion, ginger, garlic, coriander roots, stems and bacon for one minute. Pour in wine or sherry and stir fry for one minute.
- **3.** Add rice to the wok with spring onions, soy sauce, sesame oil and reserved omelette and stir fry for two minutes or until well combined and rice is heated through. Use a spatula to break up the omelette into smaller pieces while cooking. Transfer rice to a bowl and serve garnished with coriander.



Ingredients

- 1 (13.5-ounce) can light coconut milk
- 4 teaspoons red curry paste
- 2 teaspoons dark brown sugar
- 2 teaspoons fish sauce
- 1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper
- 1 1/2 cups sliced red bell pepper
- 1 cup sliced onion
- 12 ounces beef tenderloin, thinly sliced
- 1 cup torn fresh basil leaves
- 2 tablespoons fresh lime juice
- 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt
- 2 cups hot cooked brown basmati rice
- 4 lime wedges

Spoon coconut cream (thick layer at top of can) into a large skillet; stir in curry paste. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat. Add remaining coconut milk, sugar, fish sauce, and red pepper; bring to a boil. Cook 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Add bell pepper and onion; reduce heat to medium, and simmer 4 minutes. Add beef; cook 3 minutes or until done, stirring occasionally. Step 2

Remove pan from heat; stir in basil, lime juice, and salt. Serve beef mixture with rice and lime wedges.

Dessert



Blueberry Cobbler

Ingredients Serves: 6

- Filling
- 360g fresh or frozen blueberries
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 lemon, juiced
- 200g white sugar, to taste
- 1/2 teaspoon plain flour
- 1 tablespoon butter, melted
- Topping
- 220g plain flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 6 tablespoons white sugar
- 70g butter
- 240ml milk
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- ground cinnamon, to taste

Directions

Preparation:15min > Cook:25min > Ready in:40min

- 1. **Filling:** Lightly grease a 20cm square baking dish. Place the blueberries into the baking dish then mix with vanilla and lemon juice. Sprinkle with the sugar and 1/2 teaspoon of flour, then stir in the tablespoon of melted butter. Set aside.
- 2. **Topping:** In a medium bowl, stir together the flour, baking powder and sugar. Rub in the butter using your fingers, or cut in with a pastry blender, until it is in small pieces. Make a well in the centre then quickly stir in the milk. Mix just until moistened. You should have a very thick batter, or very wet dough. You may need to add a splash more milk. Cover then let batter rest for 10 minutes.
- 3. **To Assemble:** Preheat the oven to 190 degrees C. Spoon the batter over the blueberries, leaving only a few small holes for the berries to peek through. Mix together the cinnamon and 2 teaspoons sugar then sprinkle over the top.

Bake until the top is golden brown, for 20 to 25 minutes. A knife inserted into the topping should come out clean. Let cool until just warm before serving. This can store in the refrigerator for 2 days.

Tip For a thicker blueberry filling, add up to 1 tablespoon of flour instead of just 1/2 teaspoon.








Start in the centre.
