COUNCIL NEWS

CEO Update

This month has been relatively busy with a host of administrative tasks associated with the end of one financial year and the beginning of another.

The Shire Auditors, William Buck, have had their representatives on site carrying out a range of audit tasks which are designed to check, review and test our procedures, policies and output over the previous year. We have not yet received the management letter; however, from conversations with the Auditors it appears there are no significant issues that raised a red flag. At this stage we are waiting for the draft management interim audit report to be issued, and hope this can be presented to Council by the August meeting.

At the last Regional Road Group Meeting it was identified that our Group did not have its own Procedures and Guidelines as required by the State Road Use Agreement. I volunteered to produce these and present them back to meeting in November. These are now complete and are with Ernie Reynolds for him to review and make comment prior to seeking our neighbour's comments. Whilst on the subject of Ernie Reynolds, Ernie advised that he had resigned from his position after 47 years of service; I would like to publically acknowledge Ernie's valuable contribution to our region over such a period of time – THANK-YOU ERNIE.

The Landor / Dalgety Sealing will be complete by the time of this Council Meeting. Although no Councillor will complain about the rain; it has caused significant operational challenges with people continuing to drive on 'Closed Roads' and causing significant damage to our assets. I have sought legal advice on the remedies available but at this stage they are convoluted and not very practicable to implement. I have written to the Minister for road safety and Police, Paul Papalia, seeking a meeting with him to discuss this issue and perhaps find a legislative approach where we can charge drivers a significant amount in order to discourage this behaviour.

Corporate Services Update

So much has happened in 20/21 from the development of new community and infrastructure projects, to planning the construction of a new staff house, to creating the foundations of our tourism strategic plan, to being inundated with unprecedented levels of rainfall and bidding farewell to old staff and welcoming new staff to our team – 20/21 has been a very busy year!

Budgets continue to be the flavour of the month and are still high on our priority list leading into the July Council meeting. Travis from RSM has been working with the management team in finalising our draft document and working towards presenting a balanced budget for adoption in August.



Community Resource Centre Update

June has been a busy month at the CRC with an influx of visitors to the Shire. We have received so much positive feedback of our beautiful town and how well cared for it is. Training has been undertaken by our staff updating our training with key stakeholders including Services Australia, Australia Post and the WA State Library.

On June 23 the CRC hosted the Gascoyne Junction Biggest Morning Tea. With a smorgasbord of amazing treats, it was wonderful to see the community come together and raise \$415 for such a wonderful cause.

Ainsley, attended a meeting of the Gascoyne DHAC at the beginning of the month which has providing a regular medical service to Gascoyne Junction as its top priority. Discussions are still underway in relation to having a clinic here. At the moment the main difficulty is the shortage of doctors across the state due to border closures, but with an increase in capacity things will progress further. In the meantime they are working on things in the background in relation to systems and equipment that will be required.

The CRC will be introducing a new Federal Government initiative in August called Be Connected which helps to educate Australians to reduce digital illiteracy. A series of lunch and learn sessions will be held at the CRC on a range of topics including spotting scams, safe online shopping and banking, connecting with others and helpful apps for your smartphone. Through this program we will also be able to use digital technologies to record local history from the perspective of our residents.

We have been in discussions to introduce a Library Management System for our local library. This will help with reporting, but most importantly will enable us to offer all residents of the Shire access to the library catalogue and to borrow remotely. It will also allow us to curate a local history collection.

A second meeting of the Visit Upper Gascoyne was held, with key projects identified for tourism across the Shire. The Tourism and Community Development Officer is working on a Tourism Action Plan to put in place which will have a first draft for the next meeting in September. A tourism advertisement for the Shire is currently running in June, July and August in the Seniors newspaper to which we have had a great initial responses, with people popping out to see what we have on offer.

Manager of Works and Services

I would like to thank my colleagues for an enormous effort in delivering the works programme and projects that we managed to complete in such a hectic and wet financial year. Unfortunately we have some projects uncompleted due to the continuous rain and labour shortage including the new tourist stop and 6km of bitumen on Carnarvon Mullewa Road. These projects will be completed in the first half of the new financial year.

Town Crew:

The town crew have had their hands full with keeping up with the weeding of parks, gardens and roadsides. Insurance repair work on various buildings and assets to repair damage from the February storms including fencing, paving and water damaged buildings has also been undertaken. We have also had contractors replace corroded veranda poles on Lot 39 Gregory Street, repair gyprock in Lot 52 Hatch Street and the decking on the CRC veranda.

Maintenance Graders:

Our maintenance graders have finally managed to sink their teeth into actual maintenance grading for the first time this year. All year we have been chasing our tails repairing flood damage, rain damage and wheel ruts caused by people driving on closed roads. Unfortunately it didn't last long as we have to revert to repairing wheel ruts once again caused by people ignoring closed roads and wet weather during the school holidays. Once again this has distracted us from what we should be doing and cost the shire significantly.

Construction Crew:

The construction crew have been carrying out repairs as mentioned while we wait for the new budget and works program to be adopted. If our proposed program is approved we will continue preparing for a further 7km of bitumen on the Carnarvon Mullewa Road and complete the remaining bitumen from our 20/21 schedule at the same time.

Equipment:

The new grader camp has arrived and the final minor alterations are being made before it is put to work. We have sent our Bruce Rock side tipper to Geraldton to have the spring hangers and hydraulic ram mounting blocks replaced. We managed to nurse the trailer through until we had a break in works to carry out the repairs. Our mechanic Shane Pridham also used the quiet period to complete some minor repairs to various equipment and plant.

Next week we will advertise the sale of one of our 140M graders and padfoot rollers. We will then use the WALGA Preferred Supplier portal to procure replacement machines.



Scope of work

- Upgrade of approx. 13km of Dalgety Downs Landor Rd, 100m of Landor Mt Augustus Rd and 600m of Landor Meekatharra Rd from an unsealed standard to a sealed standard.
- Dean Contracting's scope of work comprised:
 - Earthworks
 - Pavement
 - Drainage floodways and culverts
 - Stock grid replacement
 - Roadside furniture (signs, guideposts)
- Boral's scope of work comprised:
 - Design and supply of bitumen spray seal
- Total cost was estimated at approx. \$3.9M
- Works were funded 47% via AGRN908 DRFAWA (flood damage) and 53% via the Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity Program (HVSPP).

Current Status

- Dean Contracting's scope is complete.
- Boral's scope is complete.
- Both contractors have a 12-month defect liability period
- Supporting financial documentation is being prepared and collated in preparation for submission to DFES for reimbursement of DRFAWA funds and MRWA for reimbursement of HVSPP funds.
- Total final cost of works is still being determined but is expected to be approx. similar to the budgeted amount.

We are a large shire of 46,602 square kilometres with approximately 1,950kms of unsealed roads and our team takes great pride in looking after these roads to ensure everyone enjoys a safe comfortable drive.

Sometimes we need to close roads to traffic due to wet conditions. While this may be an inconvenience in the short term, we do it for your own safety and to ensure safe roads all year round for visitors and locals. It is important to check local weather conditions and forecasts before travelling on unsealed roads; this information can be found at www.bom.gov.au. Severe damage can occur to roads when people drive on closed or wet roads. It is not only extremely dangerous but can be costly for our shire to repair. Please consider those that live in the Shire of Upper Gascoyne and depend on these roads all year.

Please do not drive on our roads if they are closed. Penalties may apply to those who choose to ignore "Road Closed" signs and the shire may choose to prosecute offenders for the cost of repairs. If you have an accident or injury on a closed road, you may not be covered by your insurance company. This applies to locals and visitors alike.

We make every effort to minimise delays and appreciate your patience and assistance when roads are closed.

To be eligible to vote or nominate for a vacant position in this election you must be on the State Electoral Roll or be on the Owners/Occupiers Roll.

You can check to see if you are on the State Roll by going to https://www.elections.wa.gov.au

If you are not registered on the applicable voting rolls you can make application to the CEO for the Shire of Upper Gascoyne to be added to the Owners / Occupiers Roll. This means you may live in another area but own or rent / lease land in the Local Government District or it could mean that you reside in the Local Government Area. This applies to Mining Tenements, Pastoral Leases, Commercial / Industrial / Residential Land.

Applications for both the residents and owner/occupiers roll close at

5:00pm on Friday 27 August 2021

For those intending to nominate for a Councillor position the first date you can nominate on the


2nd of September 2021.

This has to be done on a prescribed form and must be lodged with the returning officer.

The nomination period is open for 8 days and closes at 4.00pm on the 9th of September 2021.

All candidates must complete an online candidate induction prior to nominating for election so they are fully aware of what to expect as an elected member and the rules related to campaigning. This will be available on the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries web site. Candidates must also make a deposit of \$80 which is repaid if the candidate receives more than 5% of the vote.

All are encouraged to be a part of this process whether this be by nominating to be a Councillor or voting for your preferred candidate.



ROSS COLLINS

On behalf of the Shire of Upper Gascoyne and broader community we offer our most sincere condolences to Ross' family and friends.

Ross has spent most of his life as a pastoralist whom held the lease of Glenburgh Station situated in the Upper Gascoyne Shire. He is the 3rd generation of the Collins family, which the property was named Glenburgh by Ross's grandfather, Charles Collins in 1887.

Ross was elected as a shire councillor in 1975 and served the shire for five years until stepping down. He ran again for council in 1985 and was re-elected. Ross became the shire President in 1990 and remained so until he retired in 2015.

In 2004 Ross was honoured to receive an Order of Australia (OAM) for his service to the community of Upper Gascoyne.

Ross served on the council for 35 years with 25 years as the President for the Shire of Upper Gascoyne. Ross was made a Freeman of the shire in 2015.

Name the Visitors Stop




Despite some delays due to the wet weather the Visitor's Stop at the Gascoyne Junction is beginning to come together.

These names will be considered and voted on by the Shire of Upper Cascoyne Council Members.







The Year 5 and 6 students joined in with the Carnarvon teams for the Winter Carnival held late last term.


Bridie played soccer and Dustin played AFL. Thanks to Carnarvon Community College for making our students feel welcome on the day.


THEME 1

Dustin categorised different situations into the four main categories that make up the Rights of the Child: The right to Protection, to Speak Freely, to be supported in all areas of their Development and the right to Survival.

Getting set up for video calling

Here are some top tips for making video calls over the internet.

What is video calling?

One of the great things about the internet is that it lets you make video calls, for free, at just about any time you want.

A video call is just like a phone call, but you can also see the face of the person, or people, you're speaking to.

What you need

You probably already have everything you need to make video calls.

The key things you need are:

- A camera, or 'webcam', for capturing video.
- A microphone for talking into.
- Speakers for hearing the person you're calling.

All these things are built into most computing devices, including desktop computers, laptops, tablets and smartphones. Some desktops What you? might not have web cameras, however. If this is the case, you can buy a separate webcam and plug it into your desktop computer.

You will also need the right application.



What you'll need to make video calls

Getting set up for video calling

Video calling applications

There are a number of video calling applications. Some of the best known are:

- Skype
- WhatsApp
- FaceTime







Each of these applications can be downloaded for free from official App stores. FaceTime and Skype actually come already installed on many devices. When you video chat with someone, they have to be using the same application as you. If you're using Skype, you can't call someone using WhatsApp, for example.

How much it costs

Most video calls are free. You can talk for as long as you want.

There are some exceptions. Skype, for example, lets you make voice calls from your computer to a normal phone line, but this is not free. Calling another person who's also using Skype is totally free, however.

Using the camera

The camera on your device is usually located just above the screen. To use it, just follow these guidelines:

- If you're calling from a computer, sit and use your laptop or desktop computer from a normal, comfortable typing position.
- With a smartphone or tablet, you hold it at a comfortable distance from your face. Usually you will be holding it tall-ways.



Sit in a normal, comfortable position

Getting set up for video calling

Using the microphone and speakers

When talking during a video chat, just speak normally. You don't need to shout.

The voice of the other person will come out through the speakers on your device.

If you have trouble hearing them, you can turn up the volume using the volume buttons on your device.



Time to call

Lots of people use video calls, and it is now very easy to do. Usually you just choose a person's name from the contact list on your device and press the video call button. The other person's device will ring, and when they pick up you can start talking.

It's that easy!





STRAWBERRY AND RICOTTA CROSTINI

Ingredients

10 baguette slices, sliced on an angle
125g / 1 cup fresh ricotta
125g / 2 cups fresh strawberries, quartered
fresh mint
balsamic vinegar
salt and coarsely ground black pepper



Method

- 1. Lightly toast the baguette slices and spread the fresh ricotta evenly between each slice
- 2. Divide the strawberries into quarters and place among the slices.
- 3. Garnish with mint before lightly drizzling the balsamic vinegar over each crostini
- 4. Finish with a sprinkle of salt and pepper
