

COUNCIL NEWS

CEO Update

John has been away on leave for the past three weeks with Sa and I filling in as Acting CEO's.We have both had our hands full with budget reviews, eQuotes, public tenders, completing road inspections and fielding phone calls from John.

Hastings have provided us with feedback regarding our proposed changes to the Draft Road Use Agreement (RUA). At the time of writing, revision C of the draft hit our desks and we are reviewing the updated version. I am pleased to say that the RUA is getting very close to being formalised and mutually agreed upon. Hastings have demonstrated that they are committed to producing a document that is in alignment with all stake holders' values and priorities.

Corporate Services Update

The Corporate Services staff are now back in full swing. Dates have been confirmed for our Interim Audit with William Buck and this will be scheduled in April. Preparation will commence shortly on the Auditors requirements list.

After postponing an onsite visit in February due to the bushfire events that we had in the area, the visit from our website developer finally occurred on March 15 and 16. Even this visit was touch and go with a fire flaring up again in our neighbouring Carnarvon Shire. Chris Ashplant from Market Creations attended our office to deliver a workshop on developing further improvements on our Shire website. Our agenda for the two day consultation was focused on areas including our Road report, providing statutory content to meet compliance, an update to our Tourism pages, functionality, accessibility and ease of navigation to information, formatting and branding etc.

For the staff that attended it was very beneficial to have Chris onsite. This gave us the opportunity to highlight areas of concern, and find out how we as administrator users can improve on them to create not just a better website, but a better experience for our end users.

In closing and keeping to the topic of professional development, staff had the opportunity to undertake Forklift training on site at the beginning of the month. The training consisted of both theory and a practical test, which took a day and a half to complete. I am proud to advise that all staff who participated in the training passed with flying colours and are now licensed forklift operators.



The Community Resource Centre is gearing up to celebrate its 10th Birthday this October.

There are events and activities planned throughout the year for our community and visitors to the Shire.

In February we again hosted a COVID Clinic to begin to administer booster shots to the residents of Upper Gascoyne which saw another great turn out from our residents despite some closed roads. Our populations is over 75% double vaccinated and 45% boosted. From ongoing meetings with WACHS the CRC will recommence hosting a monthly GP clinic from April 5. This date is tentative with final details still being arranged but equipment has begun arriving to set up a permanent medical clinic room in the CRC. The doctor that has been allocated will be based in Carnarvon and will also have a role on other outreach projects across the Gascoyne and in an educational role at the Rural Clinical School.

The first of our major events for 2022 is being held on April 1, with Bogan Bingo coming to Gascoyne Junction for a night of fun at the Pavilion. Our next large event will be on July 23 with a bush dance to celebrate Christmas in July.




Work is scheduled to commence in the next month or so on becoming a registered Dark Sky destination in readiness for the 2023 Solar Eclipse Event.We are also in the final stages of getting our Visitor Information Centre Accreditation and RV Friendly Town Accreditation in preparedness for the season ahead.Focus will then turn to the museum and commencing free walking tours of Gascoyne Junction for the tourism season each weekday afternoon.

Works and Services Report

I attended the Regional Road Group and WALGA Zone meeting with the CEO and Shire President on 25th February. We are pleased to announce that we have fully expended our RRG expenditure for 2020-21. We also notified the group of our additional funding including the \$2.5M for the Pells Bitumen upgrades and \$300,000 in Indigenous Access funding to re-sheet approximately 3km of the Landor Mount Augustus Road.

The Shire assisted in fighting fires on Doorawarrah Station. The Shire deployed Ian Golding in a grader to create a firebreak along the Carnarvon Mullewa road while Frank Drayton manned our fire truck. I assisted in delivering fuel to various plant assisting in the field. I am glad to say that the fire was contained within three days and a major disaster averted.

Fortunately for pastoralists we have received some scattered heavy falls within the Shire however it has once again impacted our road network. Pingandy, Dooley Downs and the top end of Cobra Dairy Creek were significantly damaged. We are assessing whether the damage warrants a claim with DFRWA and hope to hear back from them in the next few days.



Landor Meekatharra Road Bitumen Project (R2R)

The rain also delayed our start on the new bitumen seal section on Landor Meekatharra Road. The crew have since made a solid start and have pulled in the batters and begun laying in the new basecourse. We have scaled the project back to 3km of seal after receiving seal quotes and to not exceed our budget.

Indigenous Access Resheeting Landor Mt Augustus Rd (MRWA)

Once the Landor Meeka bitumen works are completed we will resheet 1km of road in front of the Landor Race track and approximately 2km directly south of the Burringurrah Community. Both sections have unravelled and require a resheeting. This will take us right through until the end of the financial year.

Pells Bitumen Project (MRWA funded)

We have been fortunate enough to receive \$2.5M from MRWA State Roads Initiative Fund surplus. To date we have appointed Greenfields Technical Services as project managers, Quantum Surveys have completed an onsite pickup and are working with GTS to engineer the final design. Downer were successful in securing the sealing contract. A schedule of rates were received via eQuotes but declined.

As a result another request for quote was posted to the same supplier and several others. As Acting CEO at the time, I have appointed THEM Earthmoving the contract to supply plant and labour hire for the upgrade works. Works are expected to begin in April. We expect to complete approximately 8km of new seal.

We have written to MRWA to thank them for their support and requested more funding to continue the project further to the east.We are hoping for more good news in August.

Tourist Stop

Unfortunately once again there hasn't been a lot of progress at the new tourist stop. Two thirds of the bitumen has been reconstructed however the remainder was deemed non-conforming and will need to be reconstructed for the fourth time. The turf is expected to be laid in May and remaining concrete and construction to resume on the 14th March. GBSC have indicated that trades will arrive around 15th March to complete all buildings and services over a two week period.

Town Water Supply

We were unsuccessful in gaining support from the Yingarrda Corporation in finding a suitable site for the town reticulation water supply and all but given up on moving the bore. We have notified Water Corp and DWER that we will no longer be looking to relocate the bore. As such the need to identify a more permanent solution for the town has been escalated. We have conducted a public tender for the drilling of an exploration hole in town. Unfortunately quotes far exceeded the estimate amount we were first advised.

Council Chambers Upgrades

Sean has been busy finalising quotes and trades to make a start on the upgrades. At this stage work will commence in April. The acceptance of a quote the Shire received from Redfish Technologies to supply and install IT equipment and hardware as part of the chambers refurbishment project has been accepted. We hope to commence the building renovations part of this project within the next few months and the IT upgrade will follow these improvements thereafter.



New tourist trails highlight the outback appeal of Gascoyne and Murchison

Western Australia's longest self-drive trail network - the 3,000km Gascoyne Murchison Outback Pathways project was officially opened today.

In ceremonies at Gascoyne Junction and Wooleen Station today, Gascoyne Minister Tom Stephens launched three pathways stretching across the Gascoyne and Mid-West regions.

These included:

the Kingsford-Smith Mail Run from Carnarvon to Meekatharra via Mt Augustus National Park;

the Wool Wagon Pathway from Geraldton or Yalgoo, through the Murchison to Gascoyne Junction and orward to Exmouth; and

the Miners Pathway that includes Paynes Find, Meekathama, Mt Magnet, Cue, Sandstone and Yalgoo.

"This wonderful cross-regional initiative will provide a sound basis for developing tourism opportunities and diversifying regional economies," Mr Stephens said. "The Gascoyne and Murchison outback regions, with their wealth of history and natural beauty, are well placed to cater for eco-tourism, heritage tourism and adventure holidays.

'These are growth industries in the region.

"Interpretive signage and travel brochures will enrich visitors" experiences and attract more travellers.

"This positive approach has already encouraged new tourism services and investment with a 24-hour fuel service opening in Yalgoo and many pastoral lessees constructing accommodation units.

"New attractions such as the Meeka Rangelands Discovery Trail in Meekatharra, the Piyarti Yardi Aboriginal Heritage and Cultural Centre in Carnaryon and the Naaguja Cultural Trail in Geraldion are being developed."

This project was developed through the Gascoyne Murchison Strategy, which identified tourism as a sustainable diversification option to improve the economic, environmental and social viability of the Gascoyne Murchison rangelands.

The project has received financial and in kind assistance worth more than \$400,000 from Federal, State, local government and tourism industry sources.

It was initiated by the State Governments Gascoyne and Mid-West Development Commissions.

Support was provided through the Federal Department of Transport and Regional Services; and WA agencies including the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Local Government and Regional Development and the WA Tourism Commission and its zone councils covering Australia's Golden Cutback and Australia's Coral Coast.

Eleven local governments - Camarvon, Cue, Exmouth, the City of Garaldton, Meekatharra, Mt. Magnet, Mullewa, Murchison, Sandstone, Upper Gascoyne and Yalgoo - are also participating in the project.

Main Fabric-

Cut 4 strips @ 3½" then crosscut into 45 squares 3½" x 3½", put into bag labelled A

Cut 2 strips @ 3½" and put into bag labelled 3

Cut 10 strips @ 2" then put 4 into bag labelled 1, 4 into bag labelled 2, and 2 into bag labelled 4

Accent Fabric-

Cut 4 strips @ 2" then crosscut into 72 squares 2"x 2", put into bag labelled B

Cut 4 strips @ 4" then crosscut into 36 squares 4" x 4", put into bag labelled C

Background Fabric-

Cut 4 strips @ 4" and crosscut into 36 squares 4" x 4", put into bag labelled C

Cut 3 strips @ 31/2" then crosscut into 36 squares 31/2" x 31/2", put into bag labelled D

Cut 2 strips @ 2" then crosscut into 36 squares 2" x 2", put into bag labelled E

Cut 3 strips @ 2" then crosscut into 36 rectangles 3½" x 2", put into bag labelled B

Cut 4 strips @ 2¾", put into bag labelled 4

Cut 4 strips @ 1¼", put into bag labelled 2

Cut 2 strips @ 31/2", put into bag labelled 1

Cut 6 strips @ 2", put 2 into bag labelled 2 and 4 into bag labelled 3

How does COVID spread?

Ingredents

Hot Cross Bun Dough:

2 1/4 tsp active dry or instant yeast, not quick or rapid-rise yeast

1/4 cup lukewarm water

1 tsp sugar

1/2 cup lukewarm milk, scalded to 180F, then cooled to 105F (*see instructions for how to)

1/4 cup butter, at room temperature

1/4 cup white sugar

1 1/2 large eggs, lightly beaten (*see Note 1)

1 cup raisins, currants and/or peel, plumped (*see Note 2)

1/4 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. vanilla

2 1/2 - 3 cups all-purpose flour

1/2 tsp. cinnamon

1/2 tsp. ground allspice

1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg

1/2 tsp. ground mace, if you don't have, add 1/8 tsp

Glaze: (after baking)

2 Tbsp white sugar

3 Tbsp hot water



1 cup icing/confectioners' sugar

1/2 tsp vanilla

2 - 3 tsp cream or milk, plus more, as needed, to make a pipeable icing



Method

- 1. Scalding the milk: Heat milk in a small saucepan until steaming or 180F. Remove from heat and let cool to just barely lukewarm (105F) or room temperature.
- 2. Plump the raisins (if using): Place raisins in a small bowl. Cover with very hot or boiling water and let stand 15 minutes. Drain and dry well before adding to dough.
- 3. Dissolve yeast in lukewarm water (about 105F) and the 1 tsp.sugar. in a small bowl. Let stand for 10 minutes.
- 4. In a large bowl or the bowl of a stand mixer with a kneading hook, combine the scalded milk, softened butter,1/4 cupsugar, salt, vanilla and lightly beaten eggs. Add the yeast yeast mixture and mix to combine. Mix in the flour,1/2 cupat a time, adding the spices with the third addition of flour, and the raisins/peel/currants with the next addition of flour, making sure the fruit is well covered with flour before mixing in.
- 5. Start kneading with hands or mixer, adding only enough flour to keep dough from sticking. Knead at least 5 minutes. Place dough into a greased bowl, sprinkle lightly with flour, cover with a damp cloth and leave in a warm, draft-free place until doubled in bulk.
- 6. Punch down dough. Cover again with flour and damp cloth and leave to rise another 30 minutes.
- 7. Preheat oven to 350F. (not fan assisted)
- 8. Divide dough into 9 equal-sized pieces. *I like to weigh the dough and divide that number by the number of buns I want to make, then weigh out each piece to that weight. That way all the buns will be exactly the same size.
- 9. Place balls into a greased 8x8-inch baking pan, in 3 rows or 3 buns. (For 9x13-inch pan, place in pan in 6 rows of 3). Cover pan with a clean towel and let rise until doubled.
- 10. Bake in a preheated 350° F. oven for 35-40 minutes or until golden brown and hollow sounding when tapped (or at least 195F when tested with an instant read thermometer). *Check them at 25-30 minutes and cover loosely with aluminum foil for the last part of baking, if already browned enough. They can seem "done" at about 30 minutes, but are probably not. Baking time should be at least 35-40 minutes).
- 11. Meanwhile, prepare the sugar glaze by stirring together the sugar and hot water.
- 12. Remove from oven and immediately brush tops of buns with the sugar glaze.
- 13. Allow buns to cool for 8-10 minutes in pan, then remove (in one large piece) to a cooling rack to cool completely. (Do not separate buns until ready to eat, to keep them nice and soft inside).
- 14. Once cooled or before serving, prepare the icing by beating together all the icing ingredients. Start with 2 tsp cream or milk and add more, a tiny bit at a time, until icing is piping consistency. Use a pastry bag or a ziploc bag with the corner snipped off to pipe a cross of icing on top of each bun.

How to prepare at home for COVID-19

Preparing for COVID-19 makes things easier if you become infected or exposed to COVID-19 and are required to isolate. Here are helpful tips you can do ahead of time:

- 1. Make sure you have enough face masks, hand sanitiser, and gloves. These can be purchased at supermarkets, pharmacies, and other retailers.
- 2. Prepare a COVID-19 care kit with basic medical supplies such as a thermometer, pain relief medication, and electrolytes, as well as your regular medications.
- 3. Plan ahead and nominate someone to deliver supplies such as groceries and medication in case you need them while in isolation. This could be a family member or a friend.
- 4. Plan ahead and nominate someone to help look after your children, pets, or anyone else in your care in case you need to go hospital. Again, this could be a family member or a friend, and potentially the same person who brings you any supplies.
- 5. Have an emergency contact list with important phone numbers, such as your nominated support person, emergency services and your GP.
- 6. Make sure you have activities to keep you and others in your house, such as children, entertained.

All WA households can now register to receive free Rapid Antigen Tests delivered to their home address. One person per household can register for the free RATS online. People who cannot register online can contact 13 COVID (13 26843) for assistance placing their order. Regional areas are being prioritised with delivery within 15 business days.


