



COUNCIL NEWS

CEO Report

As mentioned previously we have been very busy attempting to put the budget together. Our biggest issue, as always is to establish the closing and opening balance going from 24/25 into 25/26 which is either a surplus or a deficit. This number is very difficult to nail down but does have a profound impact on the proposed budget. I have deliberately looked to trim back capital projects as much as possible to give us time to reflect and take some pressure of my staff. Having said that, I am anticipating that we will expend close to \$20,000,000 on our capital improvements on our road infrastructure.

The road inspections by Councillors were a success from the point that it took more work to find problems. In general, the roads are in a very good standard, Jarrod and his crew should be proud of their continued quality work.

The Junction Pub and Tourist Park is operating, albeit at a reduced level of service. There are still some capital items to be replaced (Dishwasher, Deep Fryer), these are on order and hopefully should be here soon. Problems with sewage blockages have continued to be an issue mainly caused by someone putting rocks in the sewage lines, we are getting on top of this.

I have written to the Shire of Carnarvon and requested that they consider the electors of Upper Gascoyne the same as electors in Carnarvon when it comes to paying for a yearly permit to the "Blow Holes". It appears that the Carnarvon Administration will look to support this request. Once we know the outcome we will advise the community.

We have been busy internally setting up a better system of communication across the whole of the organisation. We all get busy doing our own things we sometimes forget that an action by someone has an effect on someone else within the organisation. This is a symptom of our size as such we need to better manage the flow of information.

The Waste Site issue is still alive and we have not yet been able to settle on a definitive site given the complexities surrounding Native Title and difficulties in obtaining freehold titled land. It is hoped that after this meeting I will have a clearer direction as to the best way to proceed.

Manager of Works and Services Report

June is always a busy and hectic time with the closure of one budget and the planning of the next. To add to the frantic pace, we have been closing out some of our bigger projects for the year. The completion of these projects is the culmination of a massive effort from the shire staff on every level and is a huge credit to them. None of these projects are possible without the work that goes on behind the scenes to bring it all together.

The reverse osmosis plant and all the associated infrastructure is now installed and to be commissioned in the first week of July. The CRC and admin switchboard upgrades, Two River Memorial Park remote power installation, fencing around pub tanks are all done.

The refurbishment of the pub and tourist park has taken a lot more than anticipated. As works were completed, additional issues were found, and some essential assets including dishwashers, deep fryers, plumbing and air conditioners needed to be replaced or repaired. We believe we are on top of it all now and that the facility has been handed over in very good condition to the new tenants. The new property management concept has had a few teething problems with some stakeholders not sticking to due process and additional issues arising, however we believe once we are all familiar with the system that it will pay dividends

We now have a further 14.7km of bitumen on the Carnarvon Mullewa Rd. MTF once again proved they are capable of producing a high standard of work when under pressure and the project managed by Greenfields has been a huge success. We have been extremely fortunate to receive a further \$4.5 million to continue these works in the 25-26 budget.

Colas bitumen crews also completed the remaining reseal on including Killili, Viveash and Carnarvon Mullewa Rd.

MTF have also completed 9kms of resheeting on the Landor Meekatharra Road. This project was one of our Regional Road Group funding allocations.

Our construction crew have completed our Roads to Recovery project on the Carnarvon Mullewa Rd between Glenburgh and the Murchison boundary. The team should be extremely proud of the high-quality work that has drastically improved the safety and standard of this section of road. The lads finished off stabilising seventeen floodways last week. They will finish the financial year off with some maintenance grading and rolling in that area.

Works have begun on the admin building extension and will carry over into July. The additional two offices will be a welcome relief and provide a more efficient work place.

We have been very fortunate to receive funding from MRWA to complete the Landor Mount Augustus Road Realignment which will also include the construction of a new concrete crossing on the Gacoyne River. The realignment will bypass the Landor homestead and has been one of top priority projects for quite some time. We have put considerable effort and resources into the planning, design and sourcing of funding and it is a credit to our team to finally see it come to fruition.

With the end of financial year now insight and a new one on our doorstep the team have been working on putting forward their proposed budget for 2025 / 2026. This is one of our busiest times as we need to ensure that all year end processes are complete and finalise all accounts ensuring that we have a sound basis on which to build the new budget. I know that everyone will aide in ensuring that this is a smooth process and will provide further updates as we progress.



Community Resource Centre Update

On May 27, we proudly hosted our very first Kids Club—an exciting monthly event for children aged 5 to 16 in the Upper Gascoyne.

This month's theme was board games, and the room was full of laughter and friendly competition as the kids played together. It was a successful afternoon with a total of 7 kids joining in the fun.

Tourist & Community Report

Visitor Information Centre Training was conducted for new staff and the new lessees at the Junction Pub & Tourist Park. The outcome of this training is the imparting of knowledge of the tourism assets and road network of the region to ensure the accurate dissemination of information from all sources.

Attendance at the District Health Advisory Committee meeting with WACHS was again an opportunity to speak to the challenges of receiving basic health care in remote areas of the state. Our currently monthly services of doctor, nursing and physio continue to be well patronised and is a wonderful asset for the Shire, but it is a start and not a final solution. An optometry clinic was held at the end of May which again was well attended. Work continues on bringing a Women's Health Clinic and Dietary Clinic to the Upper Gascoyne this year.

The Astrotourism Viewing Platform has been started with concrete poured in the second week of June at the Town Pavilion in Federation Park. This project will be completed with the installation of signage including a how to guide for stargazing and a planisphere.

A meeting has been held to determine a Scope of Work on the feasibility/business case for the Gascoyne Junction Hot Springs project in conjunction with the Gascoyne Development Commission. Water quality and visitor data is being shared as part of the development of the scope.

Our first Music in the Park was held in May following Pink Stumps Day. The purpose of these events is to provide a space for community to come together and utilise the Two Rivers Park, and to provide an experience for visitors and encourage them to extend their stay a night.

The final details are being made on our Under Gascoyne Skies Festival incorporating stargazing, astrophotography, music and food across the Upper Gascoyne from August 22 to August 30.

Attention all Residents, Non-Residents Owners and Occupiers, Joint Owners and Occupiers and Corporations of the Shire of Upper Gascoyne.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ELECTION You may be eligible to be enrolled to vote in the local government elections in October 2025 if you live in or are an owner or occupier of rateable property in the Shire of Upper Gascoyne. **Residents** you are automatically enrolled to vote if you are on the State Electoral Roll. If you are not already on the State Electoral Roll and meet the eligibility criteria, or if you have changed address recently, you must complete an enrolment form. **Enrolment Forms** You can enrol or update your details online, or download an enrolment form, via the Western Australian Electoral Commission website (www.elections.wa.gov.au/enrol). Forms are also available from the Australian Electoral Commission (www.aec.gov.au). Non-Resident Owners and **Occupiers** If you are a non-resident owner or occupier of rateable property in the Shire of Upper Gascoyne and are on the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll, you are eligible to enrol to vote. If you are not on the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll and own or occupy rateable property in the Shire of Upper Gascoyne you may be eligible to enrol to vote. This applies if you were on the last electoral roll for the Shire of Upper Gascoyne prior to May 1996 and have owned or occupied rateable property in the district continuously since this time. Please contact your local government for details. Owners of land who were on the last Local Government roll continue to retain that status until they cease to own the rateable property to which the enrolment relates. Occupiers do not have continuous enrolment and should contact the Shire of Upper Gascoyne to confirm their enrolment status. To be eligible to enrol as an occupier, you will need to have a right of continuous occupation under a lease, tenancy agreement or other legal instrument for at least the next three months following the date of the application to enrol. Joint **Owners and Occupiers** If a rateable property is owned or occupied by more than two people, a majority of the owners/occupiers may nominate two persons from amongst themselves who are on either the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll, to enrol as owner/occupier electors. **Corporations** A body corporate that owns or occupies rateable property may nominate two people who are on either the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll to enrol as owner/occupier electors.

Enrolment Forms – Non-Resident Owners and Occupiers Only

Enrolment forms can be obtained from local governments and must be lodged with the Chief Executive Officer Further information can be obtained from the Shire of Upper Gascoyne.

BUILDING CONTROL All ratepayers and electors are advised that under the Building Act 2011 the Local Government (in our case the Shire of Upper Gascoyne) are responsible for the application of the Act and Regulations. Basically, this means that any building greater than 10 square metres will require a Building License which is issued by the Shire. These requirements are applicable across the Shire and capture Pastoral Properties, Tourist Properties, Mining Properties and Townsite Properties. The Shire has attempted to get an exemption however the Building Commissioner rejected this request. Please be aware that there are significant costs associated with constructing a building without a building license, these include penalties and / or retrospective engineering certification. The Shire has a contract Building Surveyor and Town Planner to assist with any issues. In the first instance please contact the Shire CEO, John McCleary, on 0417107446.

Project Overview



The work is funded 100% by Main Roads WA. The earthworks and pavement work are being completed by MTF.


The spray sealing work is to be completed by Colas.



FROSTY BLUEBERRIES

Method

- 1 punnet fresh blueberries
- 170g reduced fat yoghurt e.g. vanilla, blueberry or honey Greek
- 1. Wash blueberries, drain well

Participants took turns throwing a cricket ball at a single wicket—if they missed, they were out; if they hit it, they advanced to the next round, moving further back each time. The competition was fierce, but it was the sharp-shooting Justin Bremer who claimed the prize.

With Team 'Di' winning the toss and electing to field first, the much-anticipated match was underway! Opening the batting for Jarrods team were Morrisy and Jack, who started cautiously with a few steady singles. But things soon ramped up when Jack sent the crowd into a cheer with a cracking four and a massive six, bringing their total to 17 runs by the end of the second over.

The momentum continued as each batting pair took their turn at the crease, averaging around 10 runs each. The standout duo of the innings was Brendo and Teresa, who smashed their way to a combined 20 runs—earning them top scorers for the team! Due to an injury, Teresa had a young runner step in to help, which may have given her that extra edge.

Chilli Garlic Pappardelle with Smashed Broccoli and Soft Eggs

Prep Time: 10 mins

Cook Time: 30 mins



Step 1 - Broccoli: Preheat the oven to 425 degrees. Arrange the broccoli on a sheet pan; drizzle with olive oil and sprinkle with salt. Roast for 20-25 minutes until softened and roasty. Smash each piece of broccoli with the back of a wooden spoon to create flat little crispy bites – transfer back to the oven and roast for another 5-10 minutes.

Step 2 - Eggs: I boil your 4 eggs . Let the eggs rest in cold water for about 5 minutes when they're done cooking.

Step 3 - Pasta: Cook pappardelle according to package directions.

Step 4 - Sauce: Melt butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Add garlic; cook until soft and fragrant. Add hoisin, honey, chili oil, and miso; whisk until mostly incorporated (it'll be a little chunky from the miso but it'll smooth out). Add reserved pasta water and let it come to a gentle simmer; add pasta and continue to cook for 3-5 minutes until the sauce is coating all of the bits of pasta.

Step 5 - Enjoy your cooking!



INGREDIENTS

Chili Garlic Pappardelle:

- 8 ounces Egg Pappardelle
- 4 tablespoons butter
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 3 tablespoons hoisin sauce
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 1 tablespoon chilli crisp
- 1 tablespoon white miso
- 1/2 cup reserved cooking water
- freshly groundblack pepper

Smashed Broccoli and Eggs:

Kids Club will now be a monthly event, so watch this space to find out what exciting




Mid-Winter Meteor Shower



Getting the best out of

a meteor shower requires late nights, dark skies, a little luck, and lots of patience. The Southern delta-Aquariids Meteor Shower comes around in mid-winter which can make it a challenge if there is cloud about.

This shower usually produces faint meteors, with the peak of about 25 meteors/hour from 10pm on 30th July, with the best viewing around 2am on 31st July when the radiant point (or where the meteors appear to be emanating from) is high in the sky and the moon has long since set. The image below indicates the radiant point.

What is a meteor shower?

A meteor (commonly called a "shooting star") is an unexpected, brief streak of light seen in our night sky. It's caused when space debris, travelling up to 75km per second, enters Earth's atmosphere. The debris can be as small as a grain of sand which burns up in the atmosphere and causes a bright streak of light to appear briefly in our night sky.

A meteor shower is a celestial spectacle where large numbers of meteors, or "shooting stars", streak across the night sky. These dazzling events occur when Earth passes through the trail of debris left by a comet or other object that has come into our Solar System and orbited around the Sun. Visible to the naked eye, meteor showers offer a mesmerising display of bright streaks, adding a touch of cosmic wonder to the night.






