



COUNCIL NEWS

CEO Report

This month I have nearly spent more time out of the office than in it. I spent a week in Perth attending to both personal and Council business. From a personal viewpoint I had my last PET Scan and then visited the Oncologist who has now officially discharged me. This means that I am Cancer Free! My most sincere and heartfelt appreciation goes to both Council and my staff for the absolute unconditional support provided. Whilst in Perth I also had my new teeth implants checked over and once again all good to go and I can now wrap my fangs around a nice juicy steak.

Josh Kirk and I attended a meeting with Main Roads to discuss road maintenance issues in the short and long term. I can't report that we secured any additional funding at this time, but we are now better informed as to how we may be able to address this issue.

Councillor Caunt and I attended a Yinggarda Board Meeting and the Yinggarda Annual General Meeting to discuss the ILUA for the residential land and proposed new waste site. THE GDC represented by their CEO Tim Bray and Burke Maslen also attended in support of the SUG. Although we did not get a definitive yes or no as the final decision must be made at a Common Law Holders Meeting scheduled for December. At face value, I got a very positive feeling with support in general from those Yinggarda members in attendance.

I will attend the RRG Meeting and WALGA Zone meeting in Carnarvon on the 21st of November. At the time of writing this I cannot provide any further details.

Manager of Works and Services Report (CEO)

As the weather gradually heats up, our town maintenance crew are busy ensuring that the parks and gardens are ready for another summer. The river bore supply has all but ceased so Sean and Brendon have been carrying the final commissioning of the town bore. This included engaging contractors to re-blast sections of the concrete casing to increase the flow rate to optimise the efficiency and output of the revers osmosis plant. Just in the nick of time.

Our maintenance graders have been working on Cobra dairy Creek, Ullawarra and Carnarvon Mullewa Roads. We enlisted the services of Brett Kanny to assist our maintenance graders for a fortnight. Brett was joined by our operator Jeff Pyman and together they completed sections of Ullawarra road and clearing the shoulders on our bitumen sections of C'von Mullewa.

Dameon Whitby enjoyed a couple of weeks on leave and Jeff filled in for him on the construction crew. The crew have all but completed the re-sheeting of approximately 14kms between dairy Creek and Glenburgh. This is one of our RRG projects. The crew will mobilise to Cobra Dairy Creek Rd after Christmas.

ABBL Contracting have completed various bitumen patching works throughout the shire and have also repaired/adjusted several stock grids. They will begin a focus on signage on various roads up to and after Christmas.

Dean Contracting have almost completed the earthworks on C'von Mullewa Road in readiness for Colas to seal in late November. Colas will also complete resealing on various sections of C'von Mullewa Road and the section in font of Burringurrah on the Landor Mt Augustus road.

Manager of Finance and Corporate Services

Our onsite audit commenced on Monday the 6th October and the week went smoothly with minimal queries coming through which a testament to the team and what an excellent job everyone does. We are currently in the process of finalising the audit and are scheduled to have our exit interview with the Office of the Auditor to be held later this morning at 10.00am. So far, we have not been flagged for any management letters and proposed best practice improvements and fingers crossed this doesn't change in the short term. It is rare for a local government to receive a clean audit and if this comes to fruition will be the second year in a row that our Shire has achieved this result.

The Bush Ball was held on the 18th of October and was an amazing success with the goal of raising \$10,000 towards adopting a room at either Crawford House or Milroy Lodge, to aide community members with accommodation, should they be in the unfortunate position of battling cancer, well exceeded. So much so Cherie is currently discussing options of adopting a room for two years or two rooms for a year instead of the goal of one! What a fantastic outcome and is a real tribute to the generosity and support of our local and neighbouring communities in the fight against Cancer! Much thanks go to Cherie in being the driving force behind this event and to Billie who, even though she no longer works for the Shire, came out to help run the event and sell raffle tickets in Carnarvon. Lastly, we can't forget Brooke, Ta-Leah, Sean, Ali and Brando who helped with setup, and cleanup after the event and apologies if I have forgotten to mention anyone else who assisted with the success of this event.



Community Resource Centre Update

The Bush Ball was a night to remember! A fantastic evening filled with great music, delicious food, and plenty of community spirit — all in support of a meaningful cause.

Our goal was to "Adopt a Room" at Crawford & Milroy Lodge to help regional patients travelling for cancer treatment.

We're thrilled to share that we raised \$16,000.00! A big thank you to Cherie and Billie for all your hard work — the community truly appreciates your efforts.

Our Community Weekend brought everyone together to celebrate Mental Health Week and Children's Week.

We started with an art session at GJRCS with Gosia from @G-Stop Art Studio who guided the kids in painting a rural sunset scene. We also set up a smoothie bar and served up fried rice and sandwiches — which were a big hit with the kids!

We heard an inspiring talk from Warren Davies – The Unbreakable Farmer who shared his inspiring story about resilience, mental health, and staying strong through life's challenges.

The weekend also featured a community BBQ, mosaic workshop, pool and darts comp, live music from Dylan Hutchins, and a delicious community dinner at the Junction Pub.

Huge thanks to the Shire of Upper Gascoyne, Gascoyne Junction CRC, GDC, and Meerilinga for making the weekend possible.

Thank you, Ta-Leah, for taking the lead and organizing this year's Halloween event!

The kids had a blast taking on a spooky scavenger hunt around town, following eight clues to find hidden treats. Everyone went all out with their costumes — congratulations to Mackenzie from Edaggee Station, winner of Best Dressed!

Tourism & Community Development Report

Physio & GP Clinics:

In liaising with the funding committee within WACHS, the proposal to extend our physio program has been denied in its present form due to insufficient funds in the budget. It is noted that the program is successful and is an important part of life in the Upper Gascoyne. A short-term extension has been arranged whilst alternate funding sources for the continuation of the programme are undertaken. All parties, Carnarvon Physiotherapy and WACHS are keen to offer continued support and delivery of the project if funding can be found. Work is underway with a priority in this space.

The GP and Nursing clinics will continue as normal with 2026 almost finalised.

The Community Development Officer Network meeting for the Gascoyne Murchison will be held in Cue with a focus on opportunities coming from 2026 being the year of the Rangeland Pastoralist, Creative Industries across the region and a chance to network and discuss programs during the third week in November.

Talks with GDC re the 2026 Mining Symposium on May 21 have begun with potential speakers currently being identified.

Tourism

Product & Experience Development: Meeting with consultants working with Jidi Jidi in the ex Waldburg space have undertaken with a positive first meeting which also included Tourism WA and GDC. Consultants have been engaged to help determine tourism experiences that could be developed in two locations of Jidi Jidi country with one being in the East of our Shire.

Dark Sky: Work continues on the submission to the International Dark Sky Committee for Gascoyne Junction to become a recognised as an International Dark Sky Community. After review our current light policy needs a few amendments which will be tabled at the December Council Meeting. The journey of the Shire of Upper Gascoyne in both our commitment to minimizing light pollution, dark sky recognition and our development of Dark Sky Tourism was presented to the International Dark Sky – Under One Sky 2025 Conference as part of a focus on SE Asia. Our case study was the only Australian presentation for the event.

In October, the Australian Regional Tourism Conference was held in Adelaide and through participating, sharing our success stories in fostering a strong community and the numerous ways with collaborate with our neighbouring Shires in tourism to forge successful local and regional outcomes was a privilege. Networking opportunities, and a strong depth of topical presentations where inspiring and also reaffirming of the work the Shire is undertaking in the tourism space.

One key conversation was with Austrade re regional data collection with conversations continuing to identify how we can gather better data from government data collection.

At the recent Perth 4WD show, 800 brochures were shared with our target market over three days. Once again we partnered with the Shire of Carnarvon to encourage visitation across the region given that 64% of our visitors spend the night prior or the night after visiting our region in Carnarvon. It was rewarding to have people visit the stand to tell us they visited the Upper Gascoyne after visiting our stand in previous years.

At the AGO Board meeting in November I was elected as the Deputy Chair of the regional tourism organisation continuing my ongoing liaison and advocacy with this key tourism partner.

Our 2026 tourism marketing strategy is almost finalised after liaising with partners and aligning our own goals. Events including the 2026 Under Gascoyne Skies Festival from May 21 to 24 have planning well underway and have been promoted at the 4WD show to encourage planning visits. A series of stargazing evenings and walking tours have also been highlighted and the Music in the Park series will continue. Signage for our walking tours and the museum is being finalised ready for installation early in the New Year.

Project Overview

The 2025-26 Carnarvon Mullewa Rd upgrade project will improve approximately 11.6 km of road by upgrading from gravel to sealed standard. The works are divided into two sections:

- SIk 88.30-94.17 Western section between Pells Crossing and Daurie Creek.
- SIk 116.00-121.60 Eastern section from Dairy Creek westward towards Congo Creek, including the Cobra Dairy Creek Rd intersection.

The project is fully funded by Main Roads WA.

Dean Contracting is carrying out earthworks and pavement construction under RFT09 24.25.

Colas is undertaking the spray seal works under RFQ02 25-26, with completion expected in late December.

Works this period – Nov 2025	Works next period – Dec 2025
Western end (Between Pells Crossing and Daurie Creek) Original scope of subgrade complete with minor improvements made to vertical curves. Original scope of basecourse completed, including provisions for wider pavement through 4x floodways. These will be stabilised with cement in the coming week. Additional 1.6km of subgrade completed An additional 1.6km of basecourse material imported, mixed and compacted. Testing scheduled for this week. Cement stabilisation of 4x floodways commencing this week. Replacement of a narrow culvert to provide enough width for the new pavement. Prime and sealing activities are due to start on the 28th Nov. Eastern end complete ready for final trim	Complete all remaining work including: Approx 98,000m2 of spray sealing Forming, shaping and tie in of all remaining drains Rock scour protection on cement stabilised floodways Signage and delineators Depending on final cost, there may be opportunity to complete another 1 – 2 weeks of subgrade in preparation for future 2026-27 works. This will be known in the coming 2 weeks.



Shopping hours last on the list for remote voters

Health, education and the provision of services after the break-up of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Commission were the top concerns of electors voting yesterday by remote polling in WA's biggest electorate, Murchison-Eyre.

At Burringurrah Aboriginal Community - 450km north-east of Carnaryon where 30 people braved 43C heat to vote - most were aware of Colin Barnett's

Kimberley canal but bemused when asked to vote on extended shopping hours in Perth.

In a drive to catch 800-1000 voters, the WA Electoral Commission will travel 5000km in the next week as far inland as the South Australian and Northern Territory border.

Commission remote polling manager Brian Moore said it was the commission's statutory responsibility to reach as many voters as possible. By travelling to the communities, the commission hoped to educate voters about postal voting.

Burringurrah chairman Bill Merritt admitted he did not know before yesterday about the referendum on trading hours.

He doubted the canal proposal would get off the ground because it would cut through many sacred sites. Community assistant manager Lindsay Councillor said most Aboriginal people in the Labor-held electorate voted Labor.





Joy Meredith has the world at her feet.



Traffic Light: (



Ingredients

- Olive oil spray
- 150g can pie apples
- 1 cup rolled oats
- ½ cup wholemeal flour
- ½ cup milk
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon baking powder
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 50g blueberries
- 4 tablespoons yoghurt

Method

- Preheat oven to 180°C. Spray small baking dish with olive oil spray
- 2. Add apples into baking dish and mash
- Add remaining ingredients, except blueberries and yoghurt, and mix until combined
- 4. Add blueberries and mix gently
- 5. Bake for 35 minutes
- 6. Allow to cool slightly and serve with a dollop of yoghurt!

O Shaking Things Up in Science!

Year 9 Investigate Earthquake-Proof Buildings

This week, our students became engineers and scientists as they explored how the design of a building can impact its stability during an earthquake. Their challenge? To design and build two identical structures, changing only ONE feature:

- the width of the base
- the height of the building
- or the distribution of mass

With this controlled experiment, students needed to:

- Define their aim what exactly were they trying to find out?
- * Create their own earthquake simulation to test each building
- ☆ Identify safety hazards before shaking things up
- ****Form a hypothesis, then put their structures to the test to see if they were right

To the right, you can see Bridie's project shows her investigation into how height affects a building's stability during an earthquake.

Food Technologies Cooking

Bridie and Sophie have been busy in the kitchen every Wednesday afternoon as part of their Food Technologies lessons. They've been exploring a range of recipes and building their cooking skills. One of the recipes they made was the Chinese mango pudding (pictured below). Well done to both students for their great effort and enthusiasm!

From there, they moved into Animal Care, exploring the facilities, listening to heartbeats with a stethoscope, comparing their own to a guinea pig's, and even giving a very calm and cooperative guinea pig a wash! To round out the day, students jumped into Visual Arts, designing and spray-painting their very own skate decks — a vibrant and creative end to their taster sessions.

No-Bake Rocky Road Cheesecake



Step 1 - Grease a 22cm round (base) springform pan. Line base and side with baking paper.

Step 2 -Place 400g chocolate in a microwave-safe bowl. Microwave on HIGH (100%), stirring every 30 seconds, for 1 minute 30 seconds or until chocolate is melted and smooth. Cool for 15 minutes. Add biscuits, marshmallows, cherries and almonds. Press biscuit mixture into base of prepared pan, pressing firmly to compact.

Step 3 - Place boiling water in a small heatproof jug. Sprinkle over gelatine. Stir until gelatine dissolves. Cool for 5 minutes.

Step 4 - Using an electric mixer, beat cream cheese, sugar, coconut and vanilla until light and fluffy. Gradually add cream, beating until mixture thickens slightly. With motor operating, add gelatine mixture, beating until just combined. Fold in raspberries. Pour mixture into pan. Level top. Refrigerate for 6 hours or until set.

Step 5 -Place remaining chocolate in a microwave-safe bowl. Microwave on HIGH (100%), stirring every 30 seconds, for 1 minute or until chocolate is melted and smooth. Transfer cheesecake to a serving plate. Top with extra whipped cream, mini marshmallows, extra marshmallows and raspberries. Drizzle with melted chocolate. Sprinkle with pistachios. Serve.



INGREDIENTS

- 3 x 160g blocks dark milk chocolate, chopped
- 1/2 x 250g packet butternut snap biscuits, roughly chopped
- 1 1/2 cups raspberry marshmallows, plus extra to serve
- 1/2 cup glace cherries
- 1/2 cup roasted almond kernels
- 1/4 cup boiling water
- 2 tsp gelatine powder
- 500g cream cheese, softened
- 2/3 cup caster sugar
- 1/3 cup desiccated coconut
- 3 tsp vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup thickened cream
- 125g punnet raspberries, plus extra to serve
- Extra 300ml thickened cream, whipped
- Mini pink and white marshmallows, to serve
- 2 tbsp Pistachios, chopped

COLLATING UPPER GASCOYNE HISTORY CAN YOU HELP?

The Shire of Upper Gascoyne is currently undertaking a project with an emphasis on preserving our past. Work has recently been undertaken to catalogue all items in the Gascoyne Junction Historical Museum and this was just the beginning. Work is underway to create signage for the Museum precinct cataloguing the history of our region. There are also projects in the early stages of development to update the Shire of Upper Gascoyne Municipal Inventory of Heritage Places, the Gascoyne Junction Town Cemetery and other burial sites across the Shire and to establish an honour board for the Upper Gascoyne War Memorial.

DO YOU KNOW OF A PLACE IN THE UPPER GASCOYNE THAT SHOULD BE ON OUR INVENTORY OF HERITAGE PLACES?

There are currently 15 sites across the Shire that are listed on the municipal heritage inventory. Former Upper Gascoyne Road Board Office, the Junction Hotel, Old Cemetery, the Station Homesteads at Carey Downs, Winderie, Jimba Jlmba, Lyons River, Mt Sandiman, Bidgemia, Dairy Creek, Minnie Creek, Mount Augustus, Landor and the original Cobra Homestead. The Former Bangemall Hotel is also listed. In 2026, we plan on conducting a review of these listings and also determining if there are more to add. 


A Red Star Disappears Behind the Moon!

If you want to see something a bit strange happening in the night sky, this lunar occultation will have you mesmerised.

Antares is a super giant red star and the 15th brightest star we see in the Southern Hemisphere's night sky. In the early hours of 15th January, the Moon will pass in front of Antares and the view should be spectacular.

When the Moon appears to move in front of another object in space like a star or a planet, this is called a lunar occultation and they can be exciting to watch. It's easier to see a lunar occultation when the Moon is near its new phase and there is hardly any illuminated surface. It means the Moon isn't so bright which makes it easier to see the object that's disappearing behind it. Likewise, a lunar occultation is more spectacular if the Moon is passing in front of a brighter star or planet. You will get the full effect! For a better view try looking through binoculars.

When and where to look:

2am to 3.10am, 15th January above the south eastern horizon. These times are suitable for Perth, the Goldfields, Wheatbelt and Mid West. Timing is a little different in the Gascoyne. The occultation will have already commenced prior to Moon rise but stargazers will be able to see Antares reappear just before 3am.


