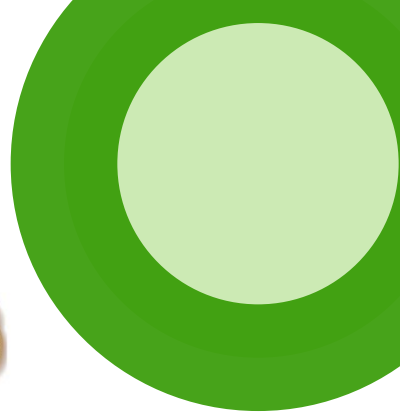

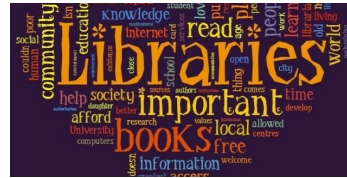

Council meetings commence at 8:30am in the Shire Council Chambers located at 4 Scott Street, Gascoyne Junction.

All ratepayers and residents are welcome to attend the council meetings and participate in the Public Question Time session which is held at the beginning of each Council Meeting.

CEO Report

This has been a month of calm before the storm type of a go. Obviously, the resignation of Hamish McTaggart as a Councillor is very regrettable but understandable given the current situation with the draught. Hamish brought his own unique perspective to Council framed around a lifetime in the region and we will miss his insight and knowledge. This will now trigger an extra ordinary election. I have notified the Executive Director of Local Government and the WA Electoral Commission.

In keeping with the above I have also received the resignation of our Executive Director of Works and Services, Mr Jarrod Walker. Jarrod has been with us for 11 years and has done a fantastic job, way above any expectations. I, for one, will miss him greatly as not only was he a valued staff member, but my friend and best mate. I wish him and his family all the very best for the future.

Again, in keeping with the above, I have also received the resignation of Councillor Blanch Walker. Blanche's last meeting will be at the OMC in May 2026. Blanche has also grown into a very effective and valued member of the Council, and we will greatly miss her input. Again, I have informed the EX Director of Local Government and the WA Electoral Commission and Blanche's vacancy will be subject to an extra ordinary election at the same time as filling the vacancy left by Hamish's resignation.

Administratively we have been busy working through the budget review and setting up process to commence the 2026/27 Budget. On the 16th of March we held a budget review workshop which was well attended and we had good feedback.

Executive Manager of Works and Services Report

General:

February and March didn't let us down in delivering another hot dry summer. Unfortunately, it has taken its toll on some of the parks and gardens around town. The town crew have been doing their best to keep everything alive but there have been casualties. The extended drought period has been tough on the whole district and as a community we hope that we get some rain soon to relieve the stress on our pastoralists.



Maintenance graders:

The extended dry weather is also starting to take its toll on the roads. We are starting to see blowouts and severe corrugations appearing quicker and more often than usual. This has been compounded by the lack of grader drivers. We were able to get a contractor for the; last two months while we search for our new maintenance grader operator. We are in discussions with a potential new starter who will be here at the end of March to check out the job.

Jeff has completed grading the Ullawarra Rd to the Lyndon Minnie Creek intersection including Eudamullah, Minnie Creek, Mangaroon and Lyndon Minnie Creek roads. We will shift Jeff across to Glenburgh Dalgety Downs Rd to work east towards Landor and then onto Mt Augustus. We have done this as the road network in that area has degraded much quicker than the northwest side of the shire. I have an enlisted labour hire to join Jeff in mid-April in P106 to speed things up.

Works Crew:

The construction crew are still resheeting sections of the Cobra Dairy Creek Road between Mooloo and Dairy Creek. We have completed roughly 4km near Mooloo and hope to complete the remaining six kilometres towards Dairy Creek in Mid-April. The crew will then mobilise to Landor Meekatharra Road to complete 12km of resheeting between Errabiddy and our Meekatharra boundary. Meekatharra have agreed for us to utilise one of their gravel pits to ensure good quality material is used. Onward Drilling are constructing a bore near our boundary this week. I have arranged for gravel to be carted as of the 13th of April. We will flat out for the remainder of the financial year to complete our works program in time.

ABBL Contracting have completed installing/replacing signage on Ullawarra and Carnarvon Mullewa roads in the last fortnight. We have focussed on the first 100km of Ullawarra and will stage the works according to budget.

Contractor Projects:

The replacement of the northern section Thirty-Three River concrete floodway is scheduled for completion in April/May by ABBL Contracting,

Dean Contracting have been delayed in starting the Pells Upgrade and additional 1.5kms on C'von Mullewa Road due to the fuel shortage. Once fuel has been secured, they will make a start.

THEM earthmoving are well advanced in the Landor bypass upgrades and made a start on the Burringurrah culverts installations. They are on track to finish in time aligning with our expectations.

Farewell:

Blanche and I have called time on our journey here in Gascoyne Junction. The last ten and half years have been some of the best years of my life and taught me so much.

I never set out to work in local government or road construction, but when the opportunity to serve the area presented itself, I knew I wanted to be here. To say it was a baptism of fire is an understatement, but I'd like to think that as a team we have managed to create some great memories and improved our district.

While I may not have been everyone's cup of tea, I always tried to do what I thought was right for our community.

I would like to thank our President Jim Caunt for encouraging me to apply in the first instance and all of Council and staff for supporting me throughout my time here. Thanks to John McCleary for his guidance, support and understanding, in particularly during my battle with Leukemia. You have all been a big influence on me and my family. We will be forever grateful.

Manager of Finance and Corporate Services

February has been a full-on month and seen some of our staff members enjoying a well-deserved break. During this time, we commenced the Budget Review with Management and Key Personnel culminating with a Workshop held on the 16th March, for in depth review by Council, prior to adoption. The feedback from Council was positive and complimentary which is a direct reflection of the high standard of work maintained by the Shire's staff.

We will be farewelling Peter Ward on the 20th March. He has worked with us for 10 weeks filling the Senior Finance Officer role and we wish him all the best in his future endeavours.

Mark Willis will be returning to the Shire and will be filling my position whilst I am Long Service Leave, commencing April, and we are looking forward to him being here.

Project Overview

The 2025-26 Landor Mt Augustus upgrade project will upgrade various segments of the Landor Mt Augustus Rd. The project is fully funded via a combination of Main Roads WA State Initiative Program (SIP) funds and Remote Access Roads (RAR) funding.

Specifically, the work comprises:

Landor Bypass

- Upgrade of approx. 6.6km of the Landor Mt Augustus Rd (Slk 1.4 – Slk 8.0) from gravel to seal
- Construction of a new 10m wide concrete floodway over the Gascoyne River
- Construction of a new 10m wide concrete floodway over the Aurilla Creek
- Construction of three new cement stabilised floodways (south of the Gascoyne River crossing)
- Upgrade of the Landor Mt Augustus Rd / Landor Mt Clere Rd intersection
- Construction of two new intersections for the private Landor Homestead Access Rd (original Landor Mt Augustus Rd)
- New 12m wide stock grid
- *Depending on funding, there may be the opportunity to upgrade the “gap” from Slk 0.1 – 1.4 from gravel to seal*

Pink Hills Culvert Upgrades

- Construction of new 3 x 1200x600 box culvert structure (Slk 65.4)
- Construction of new 3 x 1200x450 box culvert structure (Slk 65.9)
- Construction of new 6 x 1200x750 box culvert structure (Slk 79.1)
- Reforming and resheeting of the unsealed carriageway in each location

THEM Earthmoving is the Head Contractor responsible for all work.

Exmouth Civil is the “Nominated Subcontractor” who will complete all concrete and culvert works.

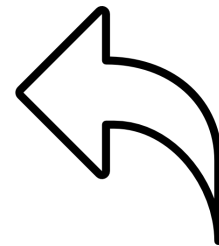
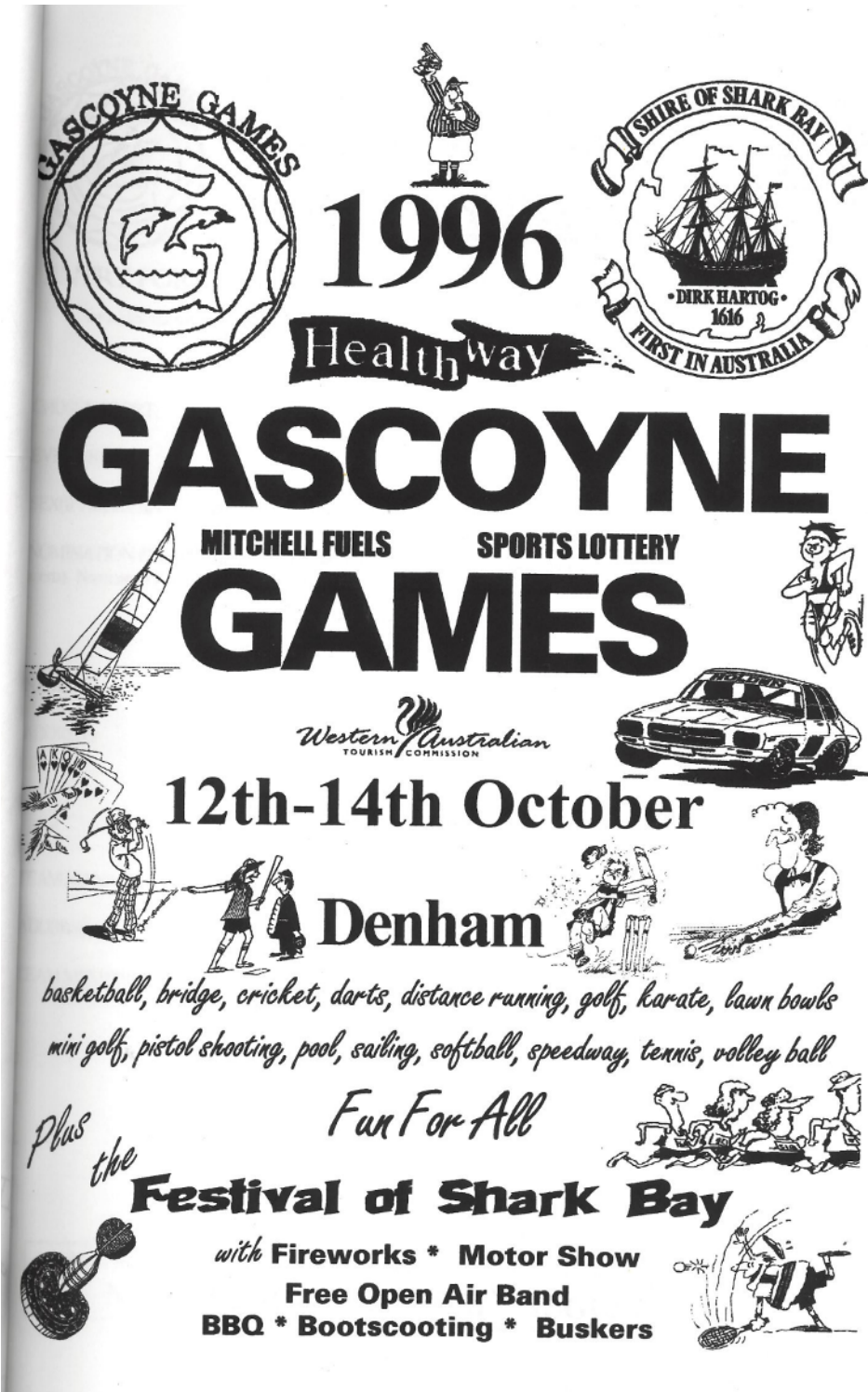

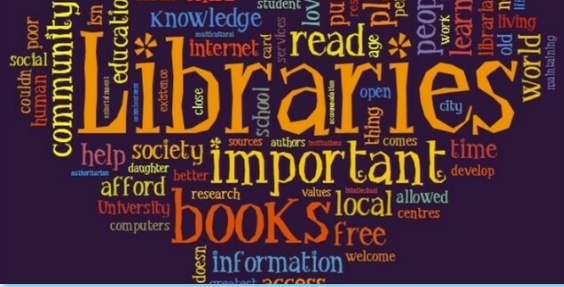

THE BAD BRIDESMAID - Adult

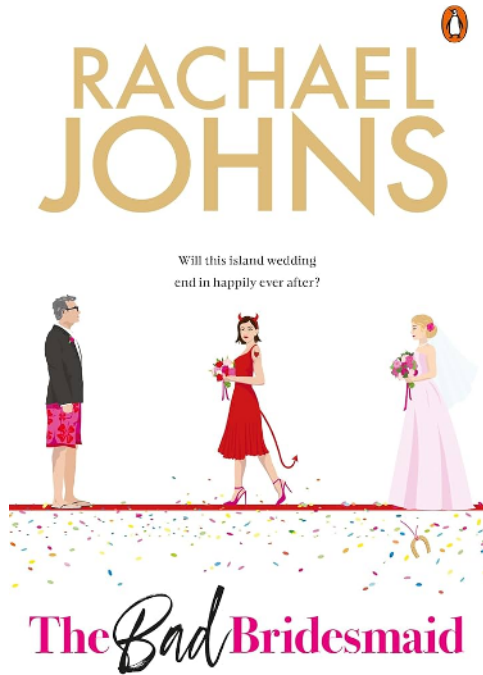
Author: Rachael Johns

THE DETENTION DETECTIVES - Junior

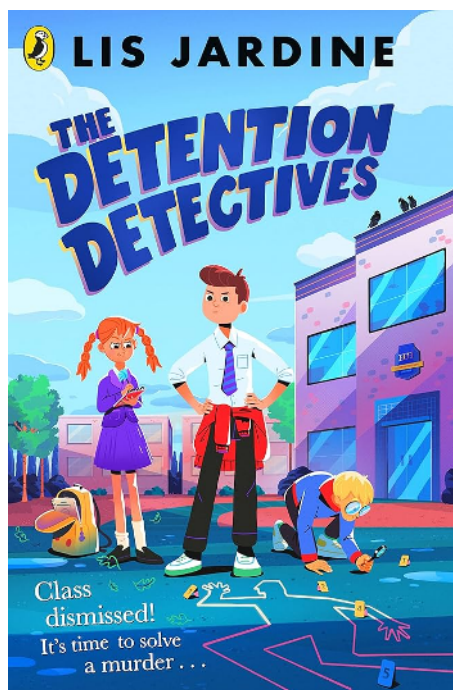

BIRDSEED CRACKERS

Traffic Light: ●

Ingredients

- 1 cup sunflower seeds
- ½ cup linseeds
- ½ cup sesame seeds
- 4 tablespoons chia seeds
- 1 cup plain flour
- 1 cup wholemeal flour
- 1 cup water
- 160ml olive oil

Method

1. Preheat oven to 180°C
2. Place seeds and flour in bowl, stir to combine
3. Add water and oil, mix to form a dough
4. Divide dough into four balls, roll each ball between two sheets of greaseproof paper to approximately 3mm thick
5. Transfer to a baking tray, remove top sheet of paper, use a knife to score the dough slightly
6. Bake for 15 – 20 minutes or until golden
7. Allow to cool on wire racks, break into pieces to serve
8. Store in airtight container for up to 2 weeks or freeze.

Exploring Traditional Bush Foods in Food Technologies

As part of our Food Technologies program at SIDE, Bridie took on the challenge of making a kangaroo steak sandwich. Unable to source steak, she used kangaroo mince instead.

Kangaroo has been an important food source for First Nations peoples for over 40,000 years. Traditionally, it was hunted sustainably using traps, tracking, and cooperative hunting techniques. The meat was cooked in a variety of ways—over open campfires, in earth ovens, or slow-roasted—and nothing went to waste. Nose-to-tail, every part of the kangaroo had a use: meat, fat, bones, sinew, hide, and organs all served practical or ceremonial purposes.

Who knew kangaroo mince could look this mouth-watering? Bridie's sandwich is a winner!

Choc Berry Chia Pudding

METHOD

Step 1

Place maple syrup in a 500mL capacity jar or container with a sealed lid, pour in some of the milk and shake to dissolve the syrup.

Step 2

Add remaining milk, chia seeds and cocoa. Shake and pour into 4 small serving glasses. Cover and refrigerate for at least 2 hours or overnight.

Step 3

Serve chilled, topped with berries.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 tbs maple syrup or golden syrup
- 1 1/2 cups reduced-fat milk
- 1/3 cup chia seeds
- 2 tsp cocoa powder
- 2 cups fresh or frozen berries

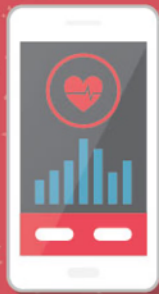

Electric, hybrid and hydrogen vehicle owners are now required to fit an EV or H label to help emergency services respond safely.

Labels are available online and from auto accessories retailers from \$10. There will be a 12-month transition period to 1 January 2027 for vehicle owners to affix the new labels. After this time, fines may apply if you fail to display the appropriate label.

While the requirement only applies to electric, hybrid or hydrogen vehicles manufactured (or modified) from 1 January 2019, all owners are encouraged to affix the labels as an important safety measure to protect our emergency services personnel.

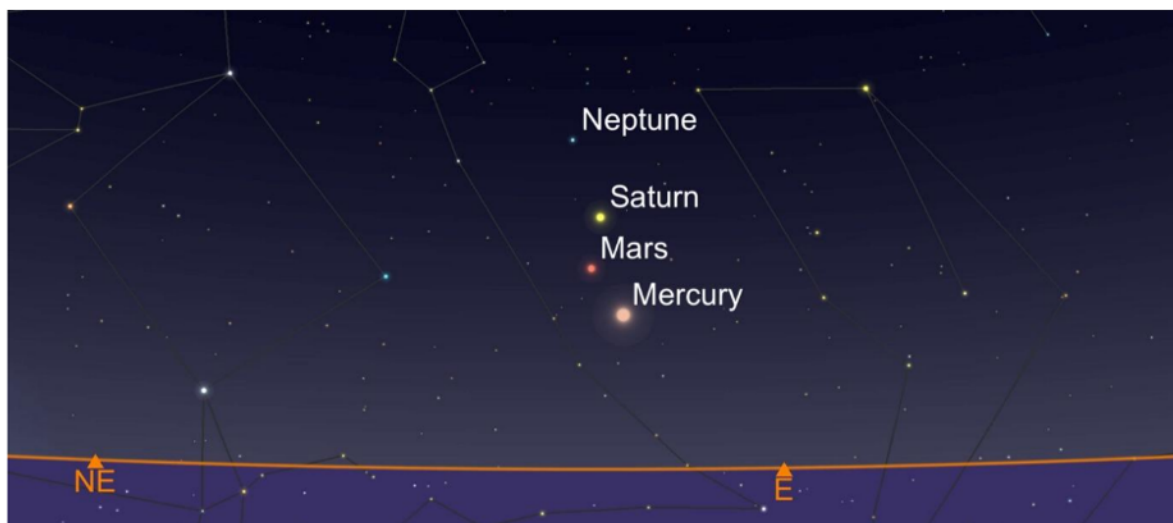
International Dark Sky Week 2026

The history and poignancy surrounding Anzac Day dawn services is immense. If you regularly attend dawn services, you'll know that the view of the stars and planets change from year to year. This year, there are three naked-eye planets visible in a celestial line up.

Saturn appears as the highest. Below is red-coloured Mars and then further towards the horizon is Mercury. Look towards the eastern horizon from 6am on 25th April. Over coming weeks you'll see them appear to move away from each other. If you watch regularly, you'll be marvelling at the motion of our amazing solar system.

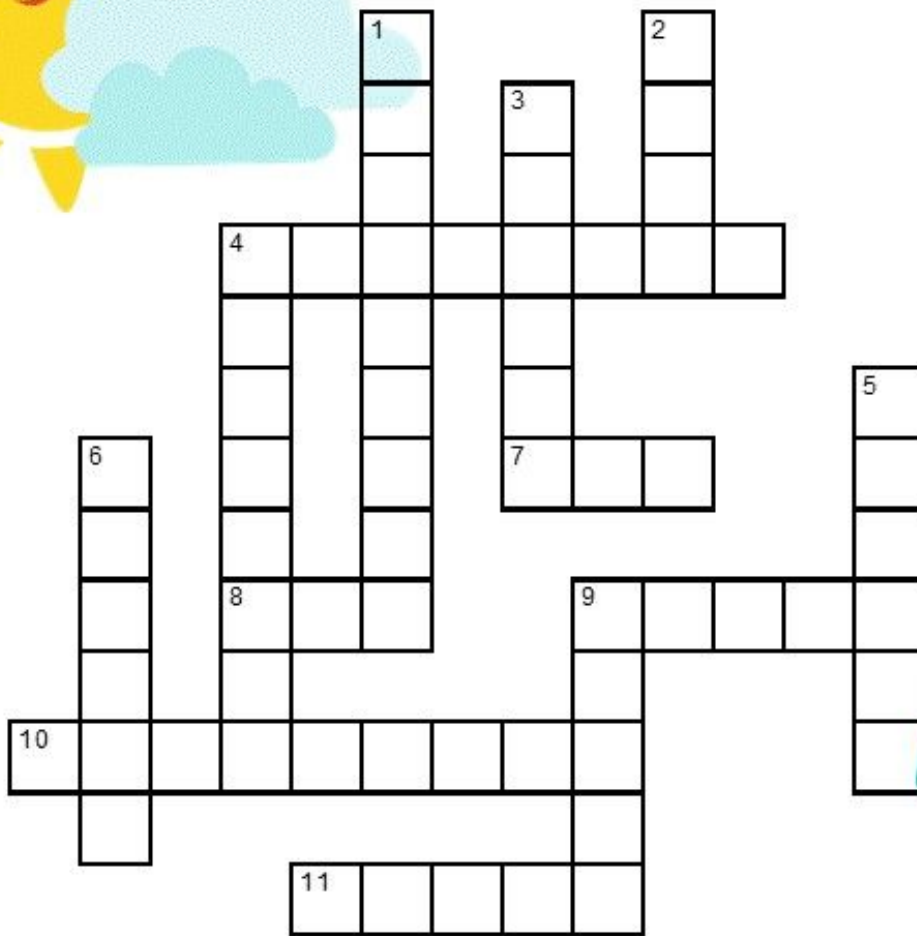
