Dear Readers

May and June has seen beautiful weather, greener lawns and flies. The Carnarvon Horseman's Club held their annual Gascoyne Junction Gymkhana which was a huge success with their biggest turnout to date. The Shire has supported this event for the last three years and it continues to grow.







The town crew have been carrying out their usual business with a focus on town gardens and the Hatch Street units. Nat and Ally have done a great job with the parks and gardens while Dave has continued with the new kitchens and flooring in the staff accommodation on hatch Street.

The rain delivered us with a nice river and as such we had to relocate the submersible pump to the bank. This will be reinstated this week. The rain has also brought on the flies and mosquitoes so we have commenced fogging around town to keep the mozzies at bay.

Biosecurity

The CRBA held a community engagement workshop at the pavilion on the 8th May. The session was aimed to provide information on what the CRBA is about and their role in pest management as well as the pastoralist's responsibilities in relation to biosecurity. Pastoralists were shown how the Shire and CRBA contribute with the use of licensed pest management technicians and Feralscan. It was also a chance for the community to give feedback and discuss all things related to biosecurity management in our region.

Unfortunately the turnout was not a success with only a handful of people showing interest. It is hoped that the next forum will gather more interest and support.

Maintenance Graders

We currently have all three graders working on maintenance grading. All three were involved in the temporary reinstatement of roads after the April rain event. We also engaged RDH, Robbro and Quadrio to reinstate the roads to a safe condition.



Council News

Thomas is continuing to the north of Ullawarra Road while Frank and Dameon are working around Carey Downs and Winderie. They will then head up the north section of Cobra Dairy Creek and across to Landor and our north/east section of the shire.

Construction Crew

We have completed all of our construction project for the 2018/19 financial year. The crew will focus on maintenance of the roads, signage and road side clearing for the remainder of this financial year.

Planning and scoping our next RRG project for 2019/20 has begun, the project includes a full reconstruction of 5-6km of road and new bitumen seal off the end of the existing bitumen on the Carnarvon Mullewa road. We have started using drone mapping to determine elevations and water flow directions. This tool assists in desktop planning rather than manually measuring and driving the road to determine the scope of works. While this does make life easier it does not replace being on the ground.





Figure 1: DronFigure 2: Drone imagery 3D view

All three contractors are progressing well, Robbro still look as though finishing their scope before RDH and Quadrio. Robbro will begin works on the Pimbee/Gilroyd and Carey Downs section at the end of May. RDH have nearly completed the Cobra Dairy Creek road and will head to Pingandy next. Quadrio are still on the Mt Clere road before continuing east on Landor Meekatharra. All three contractors have experienced difficulty with maintaining the roads between work zones however they will continue to endeavour to leave the roads in a safe good condition.

The Grants Commission Commissioners visited the Shire on 7th of May, the President and Councillor Alys McKeough also attended, I had the opportunity to make a presentation to the commission, and there is an outside possibility that we may have been able to secure additional ongoing funding under the Federal Assistance Grant. I have formally made the submission and we now await for a determination.

From a health perspective I had those suspicious dark coloured lesions removed, a few more stiches to add to the ones already received, the histology revealed that there was no cancer cells. It appears that the treatment that I am on is doing its job and is eliminating any cancer cells. I had treatment on the 17th of May and the next treatment was scheduled on the 31st of May.

On Saturday the 25th of May 2019 I travelled to Glenburgh Station to attend the engagement function for Ross and Anna. I stayed overnight and then travel to Mount Augustus where we carried out road inspections on the Monday and Tuesday with the Council Meeting on the Wednesday.

As always I am available at most times so either come in see me in the office or at home.

CATANIA THROWS SUPPORT BEHIND POLICE: #CAREFORCOPS

North West Central MP Vince Catania has thrown his support behind a new police union campaign advocating for more recognition for West Australian officers.

The campaign has been designed to show the community that police officers not only care for themselves and their colleagues but they care for the community and everyone in it.

According to the WA police union, the commitment is about everyday people committing to caring for police officers, like how police officers commit to caring for the community.

"The #Care4Cops campaign initiated by the WA police union is a great opportunity to reaffirm our support for our local police officers and show we care for their health, wellbeing and welfare," he said.

"I'd encourage groups and individuals throughout the electorate to jump online and offer their support for the campaign, it's a great way to say thanks."

"I also call on the Government to ensure police officers are adequately supported and remunerated for the vital and often challenging job they undertake," said Mr Catania.




Why climate change doesn't matter, or does it?

This story has lots of pictorial & graphical information. If you are a visual person, enjoy.

A graphical representation of an increase in average temperature doesn't mean much. A bit more hot weather, so what? Climate is more than temperature though so I'll also touch on rainfall and humidity.



Rainfall. The maps below, from the Australian Export Grains Innovation Centre, show a real change in climate in regard to seasonal rainfall patterns. In WA, the summer dominant rainfall line has moved south as much as 400 km. As it continues, the Gascoyne could do well out of this bit.




Humidity (Bad news)


The following maps show a change in frequency of days per year that the Temperature Humidity Index is above 80 from A. 1957-97 to B. a future climate scenario of +2.7°C. These maps were part of a presentation by Professor Mark Howden, Australian National University, given at the 2017 Rangelands Conference. Here's a link: https://www.austrangesoc.com.au/pages/2017-john-milne-memorial-lecture-.html (+2.7°C is based on a certain Green House Gas concentration, I'll let you look it up.)

The Temperature Humidity Index (THI) was developed as an indicator of heat load risk. THI combines measurement of environmental temperature and humidity. Thermal (heat) stress is significant in beef cattle when the THI exceeds 80. This is why Indonesia doesn't grow much of their own beef.

A. 1957 to 1997



B. Future at 2.7 degrees of warming



The interpretation of these maps is that it won't be possible to grow cattle across most of the northern rangelands in a hotter future.

The Temperature Humidity Index (THI) table, below, comes from MLA's veterinary handbook for live export, see it here: http://www.veterinaryhandbook.com.au/ContentSection.aspx?id=51

Heat is a factor but the table shows the real importance of relative humidity. Our current climate gives the Gascoyne region a maximum relative humidity of 40 to 50%. But humid climate patterns are moving south. The Kimberly's maximum relative humidity sits in a range of 60 to 80%. You can access humidity maps at the Bureau of Meteorology here: http://www.bom.gov.au/climate/

Both Gascoyne Junction and Paraburdoo have recorded temperatures of over 46 degrees this year (2019), those two locations would bracket most pastoral properties within the Upper Gascoyne. From the table, at 60% relative humidity cattle die at 44 degrees. At 80% cattle die at 40 degrees.

The earliest time that the planet could hit 2 degrees is around 2036, 17 years away, here's one reference to it: https://ohvec.org/2-degrees-celsius-how-much-time-left-to-that-climate-threshold/

Back to the opening question, does climate change matter?

Main Course

Ingredients

750g raw <u>beetroot</u>, stalks trimmed to 1cm finger-length piece <u>ginger</u>, chopped

- 3 garlic cloves
- 1 whole red chilli, seeds and all
- small bunch coriander, ½ leaves reserved to serve, remaining leaves and stalks roughly chopped
- 6 cardamom pods
- 2 tbsp tomato paste
- 2 tbsp treacle
- 2 tbsp ground cumin
- 1 tbsp ground coriander

2 tsp fennel seed

1/4 tsp ground cloves

3 tbsp <u>sunflower oil</u>

1½ kg blade <u>beef</u> (or other stewing beef), cut into big chunks

2 onions, chopped

• 2 beef stock cubes

2 tsp garam masala


naan bread, basmati rice and raita or natural yogurt, to serve.

Method

Put the beetroot in a large pan of water, bring to the boil and simmer until tender – check with a skewer; you may need to remove smaller ones first while the larger ones carry on cooking. Drain and cool, then put on rubber gloves to peel the skin and remaining stalks. Chop into large chunks and set aside two-thirds for later.

Put the remaining one-third beetroot in a food processor or blender with the ginger, garlic, chilli, chopped coriander, cardamom pods, tomato paste, treacle, cumin, ground coriander, fennel seeds, cloves and 2 tsp ground black pepper.

Whizz to a paste.



Beef & beetroot curry

Heat oven to 160C/140C fan/gas. Heat half the oil in a big flameproof casserole. Fry the beef chunks in batches until browned all over, removing to a dish as you go. Add the remaining oil, lower the heat, then tip in the onions and fry gently until softened, scraping up the beefy bits. Tip in the spice paste and fry for 5 mins until really fragrant. Return the beef and stock cubes with enough boiling water from a kettle to cover. Bring to a simmer, then put on the lid and bake for 2 hrs.

Uncover and bake for a further 30 mins until the beef is really tender. Put back on the hob and stir in the garam masala and reserved beetroot to heat through. Season well with salt, scatter with coriander leaves and serve with naan, basmati rice and raita or yogurt, if you like..

Ingredients

175g unsalted butter, softened, plus extra for areasina

3 tbsp golden syrup, plus extra for drizzling

1 tbsp fresh white breadcrumbs

splash brandy (optional but delicious)

175g golden caster sugar

zest 1 lemon

3 large eggs, beaten

175g self-raising flour

2 tbsp milk

cream, to serve

Ingredients

- 11/2 CUPS (210G) CHOPPED PITTED FRESH DATES
- 1 CUP (250ML) BOILING WATER
- 1 TEASPOON BICARBONATE OF SODA
- 100G UNSALTED BUTTER, SOFTENED
- 3/4 CUP (130G) BROWN SUGAR
- 2 EGGS
- 1 CUP (150G) SELF-RAISING FLOUR, SIFTED
- 50G UNSALTED BUTTER, EXTRA
- 11/2 CUPS (260G) BROWN SUGAR, EXTRA
- 13/4 CUPS (435ML) WATER
- ICING SUGAR, FOR DUSTING

Method

Use a small knob of butter to heavily grease a Method 1-litre pudding basin. In a small bowl, mix the 1. Preheat oven to 160°C. Place the dates, water and golden syrup with the breadcrumbs and brandy, if using, then tip into the pudding basin.

Beat butter with sugar and zest until light and fluffy, then add eggs gradually. Fold in the flour, then finally add the milk.

Spoon the mix into the pudding basin. Cover with a double layer of buttered foil and baking paper, making a pleat in the centre to allow the pudding to rise. Tie the foil securely with string, then place in a steamer or large pan containing enough gently simmering water to come halfway up the sides of the basin. Steam for 1½ hrs. Turn out onto a serving dish. Serve with lashings of clotted cream and a little extra golden syrup drizzled over if you wish.

- bicarbonate of soda in a bowl and allow to stand for 5 minutes. Place the date mixture, butter and sugar in a food processor and process until well combined. Add the eggs and flour and process until just combined. Pour the mixture into a 2-litre -capacity baking dish and set aside.
- 2. Place the extra butter, sugar and the water in a medium saucepan over medium heat and stir until the butter is melted and the sugar is dissolved. Gently pour over the pudding mixture. Bake for 40-45 minutes or until firm to touch. Allow to stand for 10-15 minutes, and dust with icing sugar to serve. Serves 6.
- + When pouring the liquid over the pudding mixture, pour it slowly over the back of a spoon so that it lands gently.
- + Before your puddings go into the oven, place them on a baking tray to catch any spills. 33




